

FINLAND TODAY

First, did you know that the oldest company in the world to operate continually is a Finnish-Swedish company, Stora Enso Oy. The Stora part of the company has been around for over 700 years. The present company was formed in 1988 when the Finnish Enso merged with the Swedish Stora. The company has duel headquarters in Helsinki and Stockholm.

Stora Enso is in the news again when it announced the sale of its North American unit, Consolidated Paper. Stora Enso had acquired Consolidated Paper in 2000, but has been losing money on the unit. Consolidated paper was sold to Cerberus Capital (isn't that the same company that bought Chrysler?) for \$2.1 billion. Consolidated paper has 8 factories, employees 4,300 people.

Stora Enso is one of the world's largest forest products companies, making magazine paper, newsprint, fine paper, pulp, packaging board and employees 44,000 people in 40 countries, with annual sales of over \$15 billion.

According to a study done at the Finnish Institute of Occupational Health in Helsinki, you need that "perfect" sleep to live longer. If you sleep less than 7 hours there is an increased risk of mortality. For men the risk increased by 26%, and for women, it increased by 21%. But if you sleep for more than 8 hours, the risk of mortality also increases. For men the risk of mortality increased by 24%, and for women it was 17%. If you use sleeping pills or aids, the risk of mortality rose by 31% for men, and 39% for women. The study was made with 21,268 twins for 6 years.

Nokia announced a major acquisition at the beginning of October, the purchase of Chicago based Navteq Corp for \$8.1 billion. Navteq makes digital maps and mapping devices. They also offer internet mapping services to such companies as MapQuest and Google. The company has completed the mapping of 69 countries. I can see it in the near future, if you need directions and a map to get to the Finnish Center, or the Finnish Heritage Museum in Fairport Harbor, just go to your Nokia cell phone.

Nokia also announced the introduction of a new phone that has the capabilities of both, the GSM cell phone networks (such as AT&T, Verizon, etc), and also WiFi capabilities, which is the broadband internet connected WLAN network. What this means is that you can use it like a regular cell phone, or use it in an area or a building, like a motel that has WiFi, and you get your calls made free (no minutes charged). Nokia currently has about 37% of the world cell phone market and produces about one million phones a day.

Which country in Europe has the highest average internet broadband connection speed? Finland is the leader at 21.7Mb,

followed by Sweden with 18.2Mb, and France with 17.6Mb. Britain, on the other hand has a speed of 2.6Mb. And by the way, the cost of the service in Britain is twice what it is in Finland. One of the reasons that Finland is leading the way is because of their fiber optic systems. I checked my own connection speed, and I had two very different results. According to my connection icon, I was connected at 100Mb. But, according to a test on the system, it was actually 24 Mb.

According to its annual survey, Transparency International, based in Germany, has again named Finland, along with Denmark, and New Zealand, as the least corrupt countries in the world. All three countries scored 9.4 out of 10. At the bottom were Mynamar (Burma) and Somalia. All five Nordic countries were in the top ten.

Did you know that there are five Finnish Goalies starting in the NHL?

They are Niklas Backstrom---Minnesota, Miikka Kiprusoff---Calgary, Kari Lehtonen---Atlanta, Fredrik Norrena---Columbus, and Vesa Toskala---Toronto. There are also two back-up goalies, Antero Niittymaki---Philadelphia, and Hannu Toivonen---St Louis.

Two Finnish Formula One drivers made history at the Japanese Grand Prix by finishing second and third. It was the first time that two Finnish flags were flying at the podium at the same time. Lewis Hamilton of England won the race followed by Finns Heikki Kovalainen, and Kimi Raikkonen.

And finally:

Reverend Maki had all his remaining teeth pulled and new dentures were made.

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

Here are some more recent additions to our library:

A FINNISH IMMIGRANT SON IN THE GREAT WAR 1918-1919 by Marion A Brown. William "Bill" Wisti was the first American-born son of Finns who immigrated to the United States in 1899 with sons Matthew and Victor. The family lived in Liminga, a rural Finnish community in Michigan's Copper Country. Some time after William Wisti died in 1970, his daughter-in-law, Ruth Wayrynen Wisti, found a shoebox containing a journal and other correspondence pertaining to William's wartime experience. Ruth sent the material to her sister-in-law, Marion, who felt it was necessary to tell her father's story.

On February 12, 1918, William Wisti enlisted in the U.S. Army and his adventure began. He hated his stateside training, as did his fellow soldiers, who said the food was "punk" and the officers "scum". One Nebraska native wrote home, "I've been in the army a month now; and I, who was crazy to join up, could be arrested for saying what I think of it now."

Wisti sailed overseas on May 8. He describes some of his experiences as being "drilled by day, bombed all night, and subject to gas at all hours". (He did suffer from the effects of mustard gas for the rest of his life.) He doesn't have a kind word to say about the YMCA, who charged the soldiers for everything, whereas the Salvation Army never charged a thing.

The soldiers' elation over the news that the war was over quickly turned to disappointment, for the return home seemed never to come; instead they were still subjected to marching, drills, and a typical soldier's life. Finally on May 23, 1919, he arrived in New York, and in June he arrived at the train station in Houghton. There was no one to meet him, as his family didn't know he was coming. He set out walking to his home in Liminga; a neighbor happened to come along, and offered him a ride home.

Eventually Bill married Hilda Lantto and they purchased a farm in Chassell Township, where they raised four sons, Theodore (Ted), George (Gordon), Andrew and Michael, and a daughter, Marion, the author of this book. You will find it in Biography, B WI.

WALL OF SILVER by Richard Kellogg. Copper is not the only precious metal found in the Copper Country. Often, where there is copper, there also is silver -- usually in tiny quantities, but occasionally in quantities large enough to get excited about. Kellogg tells the story of a silver find in the Cliff Mine area in the Copper Country. The intriguing story is told as if it were true, and yet, one is left with a question mark at the end. Some maintain that it is true; others have their doubts. We've put it in fiction because of this controversy. ForeWord magazine has given it an honorable mention Book of the Year award. Read it and let me know what you think! It's in the fiction section, F Ke.

NUORTEN LAULUKIRJAN SÄESTYKSIÄ compiled by Wilho Siukkonen. This donation from a private party is a collection of several hundred Finnish songs with words and accompaniments. Included are many familiar songs, as well as those not too familiar to American Finns. This is available for short-term use only, but with a copyright date of 1945, one could surely make copies to use for whatever purpose. You will find this in non-fiction, 784 Nu.

I hope you will be inspired to check out one of these, or any of the other numerous books in our library.
