PAAVOLA REMINISCENCE

Twenty five hardy persons braved the zero temperature to attend a wide-ranging program regarding Paavola on Sunday afternoon, February 4. Irene Faulkner. granddaughter of John Paavola informed us, by telephone, that he had worked as a surveyor for the Canadian railroads before coming to the United States. He and his wife Kaisa platted Concord City in 1895 and in 1909 the name was changed to Paavola in his honor. Photographs of his descendents were provided by his great grandson, John Levanen.

Joyce Keskitalo and Helen Wuebben, both in the Copper Country, sent written messages of their experiences in Paavola. Arne Heikkila, with his wife Delores, drove 75 miles to provide a thorough description of life in Paavola through words, pictures and maps. James Milke also had photographs and winter scenes of the area. And Bill Seaman told of efforts to reach copper in the Acadian mine.

As always in our historical meetings, there was excitement among attendees as one heard of familiar names or saw pictures of former acquaintances.

We are most grateful to everyone who contributed meaningful information about this not-forgotten community----and to Pearl Wanttaja who set the coffee table and left the premises in good order.

FINLAND TODAY

First, what do Finns think about global warming? 90% of them believe that there is global warming going on. 70% of Finns believe that the warming is caused by humans. 67% believe that it is the most serious of all the environmental problems facing mankind. Almost all the people say that they are ready to change their lifestyles to protect the environment and are waiting for their political leaders to make the necessary decisions.

After a record warm December, the temperatures have plunged in Finland. On February 6th, the temperatures went down to -40F in parts of Finland. But, its still far from the record of -61F in Kittila, in western Lapland in 1999.

The cold weather also caused record electricity consumption in Finland. The Finnish national electricity transmission grid operator, Fingrid, had to bring some reserve power on line when the consumption reached 15,000MW per hour.

Finland's Metso Paper has received a large paper making machinery order from the Japanese Oji Paper Co., Ltd. The new machinery will produce 350,000 tons of light coated paper per year. The Japanese paper and cardboard industry, ranked 3rd in the world, has ordered four major paper making production lines the past year, three of them from Metso. Metso is a global engineering and technology corporation in the pulp and paper industry, with 25,000 employees in 50 countries. Last year Metso had sales worth \$7.43 billion and with profits of \$595.3 million.

The Finnish HR Ruokatalo Group has bought Swedish Meats AB for \$330 million. Swedish Meats became part of HR Ruokatalo's Swedish subsidiary, Scan AB. With this purchase, HR Ruokatalo became the leading meat processor in Sweden. HR Ruokatalo has operations in eight northern European countries with sales over \$2 billion a year.

Nokia had a banner year last year. Its sales were up by 20% to \$53.3 billion, which is \$600 million more than the entire Finnish government's budget. Profits before taxes were \$7.41 billion. Last year Nokia sold 347 million cell phones, with about a 36% of the world wide cell phone market. Worldwide Nokia employs 68,000 workers, with about 24,000 in Finland. 60% of the people employed in Finland are in product development.

Finland is changing its TV broadcasting from analog to digital on August,2007. That means you have to buy a digital ready TV or purchase a "digibox" converter. These converters cost between \$130--\$600, depending on the bells and whistles.

Finnish pop/rock singer "Kirka" (Kirill Babitzin) has passed away. He was born to Russian immigrants in Helsinki in

1950. He began to play the accordion at the age of 5, and at 10, he won an accordion competition. But, his interest turned to pop/rock music and he formed the group called Creatures in 1964. His breakthrough occurred in 1967 when he joined the Islanders as their vocalist. In his career, he released 78 singles and 60 albums. His album, Surun Pyyhit Silmistani, released in 1985, is the 3rd best selling album in Finnish history. In 1981 and 2000, he received the "Emma" for being the best Finnish male singer. In 1991 he received the Lifetime Achievement Emma.

The 60th annual "Jussi" awards, Finland's version of the Oscar Awards, were held in Helsinki. The 'best picture of the year" went to Laitakaupungin Valot. Janne Virtanen received the Jussi for his leading male role in Valkoinen Kaupunki, and Susanna Antaro received the Jussi for the leading female in the same picture.

Finnish pop/rock groups continue to do well around the world. The group Sunrise Avenue has their single, Fairytale Gone Bad, in third place in the German and Austrian singles chart. The group Lordit, have their album, Arockalypse, in the 13th spot, in the first week out, in Japan.

The Fuji TV Network in Japan has asked the Finnish Radio Symphony Orchestra to come to Japan for a 10 concert tour, starting at the Suntory Hall in Tokyo. Fuji invites one internationally renowned symphony orchestra per year or a concert tour.

And finally,

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SCHOLARSHIP INTERVIEW

FCA College Scholarship Interview: Christopher Hella

This month the Scholarship Committee is pleased to present an interview with Christopher Hella, the third of our seven college students to be profiled. You will meet the additional four students during the coming months. We invite you to keep the Scholarship program in mind when you make donations to the Memorial Fund, and also to make specific donations to the Scholarship program.

Christopher is in his second year at Macomb Community College in the Paramedic Academy. He has classes two days a week, and clinical rotations at local hospitals three days a week. He plans to graduate as a Firefighter/ Paramedic in 2007, and is also considering taking a one-year Registered Nurse program.

Q: What is your favorite class, and why?

A: My favorite class was cardiology. I really enjoyed learning about the different areas and functions of the heart. There were many things I learned, that I had no idea even existed before. Also learning how to treat certain conditions and diseases within the heart was interesting. There are also many medications we had to learn that affect the heart.

Christopher is a busy young man! In the clinical rota-

tions, he helps the nurses care for patients. This includes giving medications, starting intravenous lines, and helping with whatever else is needed. In addition to the five days of classes and rotations, he works as an Emergency Medical Technician at Star EMS, an ambulance company in Oakland County.

Q: What are your career plans?

A: My career plans are to finish school and get a job as a Firefighter/Paramedic. My goals are to then become a fire officer and continue to advance in the field as much as I can. I also want to continue to advance my medical training. I may go through a one year Registered Nurse program as well.

Q: Do you have a mentor who has helped you in your career planning?

A: My uncle Raymond was the one who suggested looking into becoming a Firefighter/Paramedic. He helped me decide on what I wanted to do and helped me get into it. He helped me train for the Fire Academy, which I attended in March, 2006. He also supplied me with the appropriate equipment that I needed to attend.

Q: How has the FCA scholarship helped you meet your educational goals?

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

More suggestions for something to cuddle up with during these blustery winter days:

BUSINESSMAN'S GUIDE TO THE FINNISH SAUNA by Arto Paasilinna. David Waterfield, a British businessman, is on his first trip to Finland. While being shown around, the subject of saunas comes up, and David learns that Finland has over a million saunas. Waterfield's preconceived notion of the sauna was quite unlike the real thing in Finland. When his host suggests that they take a break and go to the sauna, David is quite taken aback. He knew that in London there were quite a few of these establishments, which featured female masseuses, alcohol, "intimate" massages and worse. Could it really be that Finns had a million of such houses of ill repute?

Waterfield really gets an education about the Finnish sauna, both those in the city, out in the country, even a "smoke" sauna, and learns to love the experience. The author uses this narrative to introduce the reader to Finnish sauna culture, from history of the sauna to the modern sauna "kits" that can be purchased from manufacturers. It is an educational read, with a good deal of humor thrown in. You'll find it in non-fiction, call number 390 Pa.

To the children's literature section we have added

FINLAND, from the Enchantment of the World series. It is a hardcover book beautifully illustrated, dealing with modern Finland. Even adults would enjoy this book. You will find it in the children's literature section, call number 914.71 Hi.

To the adult section we have also added several books which concentrate on individual towns in Finland, for instance, Oulu, Pudasjärvi, Iitti, Paanajärvi and Turku, books on Lapland and one on the Finnish coast and archipelago, plus an excellent new book on Helsinki by Neil Kent. The card catalog will steer you to any of these.

Not into all that much reading just now? Then the beautifully illustrated SUOMI: järvien ja metsien maa (land, of lakes and forests) is worth considering. Text is in German, Swedish, Finnish and English. It covers Finland from Helsinki to Lapland, during all seasons of the year. It's worth a look! You'll find it in non-fiction, call number 914.71 Pi.

A: The FCA scholarship has helped pay for the Paramedic Academy. Having the scholarship helped me get into the class as soon as I could. Without the scholarship I may have not had enough money to attend the Paramedic Academy and may have had to wait a year until the next one. The President of Finland wears the Star of the Order of the Lion of Finland and is Grand Master of the order.

"Dr. Waissi has had a high and active profile representing Finland in Michigan and in the greater Detroit metropolitan area, and he has contributed greatly to the activities of one of the largest Finnish-American communities in the USA," said Consul General Lipponen.

"We were able to make collaborative connections and increase the interest at many levels between Michigan and Finland and even between the United States and Finland," said Waissi, who speaks five languages and earned his doctorate in engineering with an emphasis on operations research, from the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor.
