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OVER ON FINN DRIVE

I am not much of a consumer shopper. I let my wife Donna do most of that. I, like many of you, grew up in what became known as the depression generation of the 30's, a label which may not have much meaning these days. I happen to believe I was really lucky to grow up on a farm in upstate New York. Plus, I had exposure to all the Finnish traditions that went on in those days. Unrelated Finn families would get together for parties, weddings and the events of the season. There were very few families who had any relatives in the area so these parties were an opportunity to converse in the Finnish language and even do some dancing. That was where I first learned to dance the laatikko at a young age. Many of the items for the dinner table were grown right there on the farm and then these items would show up as fried pork chops, sausage, or roasted chicken. As kids, we had to get used to this.

We learned some sound principles about saving money for a rainy day back then. A good lesson that I still hear every so often is to have "short arms and very deep pockets". As kids we learned this at the local fair deciding where to spend those few precious coins because once they were gone, that was it.

Now, the main thing I buy in the grocery store is Macintosh apples. Four years ago they were \$1.59 or so for a three pound bag. Today they are at least \$2.99 per three pound bag and higher. Well, you might ask, "What has the price of apples got to do with the Finnish Center?"

Our costs at the Finnish Center have gone up. This is more than just getting gray and getting older and being able to remember when...it's a fact. The higher cost of energy is making its mark felt everywhere. Heating, lighting, paper products, postage and transportation costs will all continue to rise and we have to watch our spending.

As members of the Finnish Center, we are so fortunate to have a Center that is free and clear of any debts. It was a fulfilled dream to reach this status. Now the challenge is to maintain this unique building and stay within our budget. Can we offer a mix of educational items for today's living, with other Scandinavian groups for the sharing of heritage and culture? Everyone has come from a different direction and has had a different life experience. We need to invite other Scandinavian groups to become members and participate in its future. Our challenge is to offer interesting events that meets the needs of folks who live within 20 mile radius of the center. Easy to arrive and easy to come back to, too!

FINLAND TODAY

First, the PISA, Program for International Student Assessment, has again placed Finnish students on top. The PISA survey scored the Finnish 15 year old students the best of 57 developed countries in the knowledge of natural science, and in the application of knowledge in solving everyday problems. Following Finland were Hong Kong and Canada. In 2004, Finnish students were judged the best in science, mathematics and literacy. The results of this year's survey on math and literacy will be given later, so I will report on them next time.

The Finnish company, Neste Oil, has announced the plan to build a bio-diesel plant in Singapore. The plant, expected to be completed in 2010, will be the largest of its type in the world. The plant will have a capacity of 800,00 tons of fuel a year, and will use palm oil as its main raw material. The plant will use similar technology at its second generation plant in Porvoo, Finland.

By the way, Neste will open its second plant in Porvoo in 2009. Neste Oil, based in Espoo, near Helsinki, had net sales worth \$18.8 billion in 2006, and has 4,700 employees.

Nokia has opened its sixth research center in China. This center, in conjunction with Siemens, is located in Hangzhou, in eastern China's Zhejiang province. It is Nokia's second largest research center, following only the one in Finland.

A master piece of Finnish art was recently sold at an auction for \$932,000, the third highest price ever for a Finnish painting. It was Eero Järnefelt's *Pyykkiranta*. The 1889 painting depicts washerwomen on a shore. The painting was bought by Anders Wiklof, a businessman and an art collector from Åland (Åhvenanmaa). Eero Järnefelt was the brother-in-law of Jean Sibelius.

The year ending British Rally was also the end of 39 year old Marcus Gronholm's 150 race career. Gronholm came second in the race, and also second in this year's Rally Championship, 4 points behind Sebastien Loeb. The British Rally was won by another Finn, Mikko Hirvonen. Gronholm ended his career with 30 wins and two World Rally Championships.

Finnish radio system, YLE, has a huge archive of about 3,000 audio clips and over 4,000 video clips from the

last 100 years. They include history, news, culture, sports, music, etc. The site is in Finnish, so if you understand Finnish, its an amazing site to surf through at www.yle.fi/elavaarkisto.

Also, according to YLE, interest in learning the Finnish language is also on the rise. Currently, Finnish is being taught in at least 110 universities in 30 countries. Finnish language classes are also available on the internet, where there seems to be a large interest from Japan and China.

Japanese television network NHK, did a nine hour direct broadcast from Santa Claus' Office on Christmas Eve. Tens of millions of people watched the broadcast. The Japanese have for years been fascinated about the Finnish Santa Claus. The Santa Claus Office is located near Rovaniemi in Finland's Lapland.

The Finnish Association for Nature Conservation has selected the 4 wheel golf cart sized off the road vehicle as its annual "most useless" product award. The objection is that the vehicles have small particle emissions that are 50 times greater than the average car, and also that its wheels leave tracks that are damaging to the environment.

November 30th was celebrated as "Buy Nothing Day" by various groups in Finland. The object of the campaign was to challenge the culture of continuous consumption, and this year's focus was on misleading advertising. The intention of Buy Nothing Day is to encourage people to desist from shopping and to live without spending money, if only for one day.

And finally, Toivo was driving a big 18 wheel truck when he decided to stop at a small out-of-town restaurant. He ordered coffee, apple pie and a hamburger. Just as the order was delivered, three tough looking bikers walked in. One of the bikers walked over and took Toivo's coffee, another biker took Toivo's apple pie, and the third one took his hamburger. Toivo didn't say anything, he just walked out the door. One of the bikers turns to the waitress and says, "He isn't much of a man, didn't even say anything." FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

VASTUUNKANTAJA (a history of the military life of Aito Keravuori) by Matti Lukkari. In 1944 when the Continuation War ended, Alto Keravuori and several other high-ranking officers in the Finnish Army were concerned that Russia would occupy Finland, and they would have no weapons with which to defend themselves. They conceived of a plan to secretly gather and conceal a large amount of weapons in various parts of Finland. In 1945 one of the persons in their group attempted to blackmail Keravuori, demanding money in exchange for keeping his mouth shut. Keravuori refused, and the authorities were notified, resulting in the immediate attempt to arrest all those who were involved. Keravuori and 33 others escaped to Sweden. However, Sweden refused to give them asylum for very long, and they were forced to seek asylum elsewhere. Some managed to escape on their own, but one of the men, Alpo Kullervo Marttinen, managed to arrange for a group of 19 to escape to the United States. This group eventually became known as "Marttinen's Men" (Marttisen Miehet), about whom a book by that title has been published in Finland. Since the men in the group had not been able to get U.S. visas, they booked passage to Venezuela, which was willing to give them visas. Instead, the men disembarked in Norfolk, Virginia, with permission to stay 60 days, but that is as far as they got.

The United States Army at this time was beginning a program of training soldiers for winter fighting. U.S. Military authorities knew of the exploits of the Finnish soldiers who fought in the Winter War in extreme snow and cold, and were eager to use the expertise of Marttinen's Men. Since they had only Venezuelan visas, they had to acquire U.S. visas by arriving in the U.S. legally. This was done by transporting them to Montreal to the U.S. Embassy. On the same day they returned with visas and were sworn into the U.S. Army.

Marttinen managed to intercede for his men whenever needed, and they were soon promoted to the rank of commissioned officers, a rare occurrence, indeed! They served as winter-fighting instructors in many parts of the U.S., including Alaska; some also served in Japan and Germany.

Keravuori, the subject of this book, who had served for 17 years in the Finnish Army, then served for 20 years in the U.S. Army, much of that time as a Green Beret, and retired as a colonel. At his retirement exercises the Army band played "Porilaisten Marssi" in honor of this Finnish/American hero! He and his wife retired to Maine, where he passed away in 1998.

VUOSI VALPON VIERAANA (A Year as the Guest of Valpo) by Eino E. Lassila. Lassila, one of the participants in the weapons-concealing incident, was not as lucky as the original 34 escapees to Sweden. He was caught and imprisoned in the Valpo Prison in Helsinki, where, by the way, Risto Ryti, President of Finland, and other high officials were also incarcerated for supposed "war crimes".

After a year, Lassila also managed to escape to Sweden, where he was threatened with extradition back to Finland. But his luck held out, and he eventually managed to get to the United States, where he also became one of Marttinen's Men.

If this subject interests you, even if reading Finnish is a struggle, I think you'd find one or both of these worth your trouble. Each of them is in the biography section, in alphabetical order by the subject of the book. If we are in the library, we'll help you locate them.

Houses were built and a rooming house for laborers was established. There were schools, a temperance hall and a cemetery.

Three major crises in close succession caused the employment and population to diminish: in 1896, a severe forest fire; in 1897, Eliasson's barn burned with a loss of 21 horses; and in 1900 his saw mill burned. Eliasson declared bankruptcy in 1901. Population figures: 1897 to 1900-250, 1901 to 1906-150 and 1960's-60.

OSKAR

The Olson family brought a framed photograph of the Alex and Hilda Olson farm (1914-1957) on which potatoes and dairy products had been produced. There were 11 children in the Olson family.

Shirley Erickson brought a striking framed 1910 painting of the red Oskar school house.

Paul Miller provided (among other things) a picture of the Koller family home which had served as the post office-and copies of forms relating to the establishment of the post office.

From Kevin Ruohonen, Barb Koski, Susan Riutta and many other Oskar residents, there was much historic material in print and in photographs-as well as snapshots by Edith Raski of Oskar, June 2007.

The above-mentioned items contributed to a lively and interesting program on Oskar (located in Stanton Township, along the Houghton Canal in

the Upper Peninsula) on Sunday afternoon November 18.

Three men: Jaakko Ojanpera, Oskar Eliasson and Sakari Hendrikson, seeking a site for a logging business, sailed into Schlatz Creek, off Portage Lake in May of 1875, where they established a settlement called Ojanpera and started a logging business. Others came, as well. Wanting a local post office, Oskar Eliasson approached the Houghton postmaster. Neither one knew how to spell "Ojanpera", and when the postmaster asked Eliasson his name and heard the name Oskar, he established that name to the post office address (1882). Eliasson was the first post master of Oskar.

Eliasson emerged as a landowner and business man in lumber and charcoal. Nels Burkman, his blacksmith, also established a lumbering and charcoal business. Other businesses included a tannery and a cheese factory. The height of the lumbering business was between 1890-1895.
