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# **CHAIRMANS CORNER**

You should be aware by now that our financial situation at the FCA is very tenuous. Our projected loss for year 2009 based upon our 2008 operations would be \$97,000.00. Obviously something must be done to turn this around. On March 4, 2009 the Board reluctantly laid off Lois Makee and Margaret Laurila in order to reduce our expenses. As a consequence their duties are now being performed by volunteers. We thank those volunteers who have stepped forward to perform those duties. The arrangement so far is working satisfactorily.

There is a committee consisting of Cortland Book, Frank Gottberg, Maria Hill, Christine Johnson, Louise Hartung, Glenn Kujansuu, Paul Hendrickson and Norbert Leppanen working to try to secure a 501c3 classification. (Presently our classification is 501c4.) The advantage is it will allow persons to deduct donations from their income tax, and free us from our property tax burden. (\$27,000,00/year.) The process the committee felt best to proceed was to set up a new corporation (Finnish American Cultural Corporation) seeking 501c3 status and if successful transfer members and all FCA assets to the new corporation. It was felt we had a better and quicker chance of securing the new classification this way. The Board of Trustees has been advised of this and have given it their blessing, however, the full membership will have to vote on this issue if the new corporation is successful in securing the 501 c3 classification. We hope to be able to go for a vote later this year. Accompanying the ballot will be an explanation of the process. Additionally, the Board is working on reducing our telephone and insurance costs, and trying to increase our revenue by securing additional rentals.

Our efforts are directed to a large extent toward improving our financial status, however, we cannot ignore our cultural activities. They are what the FCA is all about.

With everyones help we expect the Finnish Center to continue as a successful and vibrant organization.

#### OVER ON FINN DRIVE

It is Spring Time and it is time to drive over to the Finn Center. The gardens are shaping up and you can smell the flowers. The daylight hours of each day keeps getting longer and longer so Mother Nature has responded with another exciting show of designs and colors to enjoy.

The Finns celebrate the longest day of the year, Midsummer night and they call it "Juhannus". This year the Finnish Center is planning to have a gathering in the evening with food, music, sing along and maybe even an outside kokko (that is an outside bonfire). The date is June 19. It is a Friday night at 7:00 PM. Come and enjoy the food music and the gardens.

Campfires and outings are fun and can be a learning experience. Be it with the Boy Scouts or the Girl Scouts, the Indian Guides, etc., or an event celebrating the Finnish Juhannus. Talking with the Finns around the Finn Center, many still remember what the event settings were like when the bonfire was lit. Everyone has some different memories of this event and that is good. In Finland the longer hours of daylight are a dramatic change from the long hours of darkness endured during the winter months. The North country becomes known as a land of the midnight sun with 24 hours of daylight.

I was lucky in my youth to attend a number of these Juhannus events in the Finger Lakes area of up state NY. They were all held out in the country, as they were all held on the farms of Finns. The news, and the bulletins about the main Finn events in the area traveled very well via the way of the local co op feed store and food market. If you needed information that was the place you could get it and it was in English or Finnish or a little bit of both. For a Juhannus event as I remember, the sauna was always hot and in use. A couple of times us boys would get to go to the sauna twice in one night. The only requirement was you had to refill the hot water tank, firebox and all the water basins and pails with water. The water came from a well with a pitcher pump, or a pond or a creek nearby and it was hauled by the hand pail. Keeping the Sauna stove hot and having plenty of water to use is still the proper etiquette for using the sauna. It should be re-stocked and ready for the next group to use. One time the weather was so bad, the Juhannus party was cancelled until the following weekend. I never remember seeing any tents being set up in case of rain. Everyone had to seek shelter, jammed into the house, garage, or the tool shed. A rainstorm was a positive thing needed for the corn crop. During WWII when the gas rationing was going on, it was discussed that it would be unpatriotic to travel very far for social events, but many traveled the 20 miles or so. The ones that showed up considered the sauna was important too, to keep healthy. These were the days out there in the country where the local volunteer fire departments could be called if needed. A couple times the kokko bonfire was so big that it

lit up the clouds in the sky to an orange glow. The town mayor 7 miles away, called and wanted to know if a barn or a house was on fire.

The Finns in this area between the lakes really turned out for those Juhannus celebrations and with the Finnish names you can understand why, names like Niemi, Rantamaki, Maki, Uitos, Uutti, Westerberg, Koski, Koskinen, Kaupinen, Vesa, Wirta, Salonen, Salo, Walterimaki, Erickson, Huttinen, Hill, Kauma, Loumanen, Makela, Aho, Alto, Ara, Kosella, Saari, Kinne, Hack, Nicander, Maatta, Harkonen.

I also can remember there was plenty of food, of all kinds. Every family brought some kind of dish for the table and a desert. Of course hot coffee, lump sugar and pulla was served. Popular in those days was the vanilla flavored Junket made with a tablet. Remember those? Then there was the strawberry flavored J E L L O with the ole fashion whipped cream on the top. From these parties it had to be the first place I ever heard of KOOL Aid.

# **FINLAND TODAY**

First, Finland's population is getting older. For the first time in Finnish history, there are more people who are 65 years old or older, than there are people under 15 years of age.

There are more people living in Finland who were born in 1948 than any other year.

Finland has 8 cities with a population of at least 100,000.

Last year, the Finnish population grew by 26,000 to 5,326,000.

The sightless able to read LCD touch screens? Researchers at the University of Tampere in Finland have developed a system where sightless people can read a Nokia touch-screen phone. In the braille alphabet, each letter has two columns of 3 dots that are raised or not raised that are read by finger tips. The Tampere system uses a vibration pulse in place of the raised dot.

Did you know that Blancco Ltd, headquartered in Joensuu, Finland is the global leader in data erasure software? Its data erasure products are used by millions of customers in banking, industrial, governments, defense, and by companies that refurbish or destroy computer hardrives.

The Finnish government has proposed a ten percent increase in alcohol taxes. The tax increase will be higher on the higher alcohol spirits and lower on milder beverages.

This is the second time Finland has raised alcohol taxes since it lower them by 33 percent in 2004. The increase will take affect in October of this year.

Over 100 municipalities in Finland took part in the Earth Hour event. On Saturday night, March 28th, between 8:30 and 9:30pm, lights were shut off in houses, businesses, shopping centers, churches and town centers. The event was arranged by the WWF all around the world.

Wartsila Power has signed a contract with the Liberty Power Tech to build a 200 megawatt power plant in Pakistan. With this new order, the total capacity of Wartsila built power plants in Pakistan will be 1700 megawatts.

Did you know that at the NCAA Final Four and championship basketball games, the scissors used to cut down the nets were Fiskars 9.5 titanium scissors.

Probably the most famous Fiskars product is the orange plastic handle scissors. Fiskars has manufactured close to billion orange handle scissors since first introduced in 1967.

# FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

ENGLISH AND FINNISH DICTIONARY compiled by K.V. Arminen, Dewey # 494 Ar.

SUOMI SYNODIN VIISIKYMMEN-VUOTISMUISTO 1890-1940. (A SOUVENIR AL-BUM CELEBRATING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE SUOMI SYNOD 1980-1940. Ditto. Dewey # Ref 284.1 Su. KANSAKOULUN LAULUKIRJAN SÄESTYKSET (ACCOMPANIMENT FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL SONGS) compiled by Paavo Halme and Väinö Halme. You might find just the song you're looking for in here. I found the music for one of my favorites, "Mun kanteleeni kauniimmin". Dewey # 748.7 Ha.

KUVA-AAPINEN, c 1918. This is a real treasure! Our parents and grandparents probably learned to read from this in Sunday School. I know my mother did, because she quoted some of the material I found here. This will be in the adult section, Dewey number Ref 494 Ku. It is in rather fragile condition so we can't let you check it out, but you are welcome to come in and look at it.

VIIPURI by Börje Sanberg. This is an old book, c 1936, before the Winter War, when Finland lost Viipuri. Therefore it is worth a look to learn what pre-Soviet Viipuri, a city beloved by the Finns, was like. Profusely illustrated, it has text in Finnish and English. Dewey # 914.71 Sa.

WOOD AS THE BUILDING MATERIAL OF FINNS, prepared by the League of Finnish American Societies to show that Finns contributed to the building of the new America. It's a slender volume, but worth a look. Dewey # 721 Le.

FINLAND CREATES by Jack Fields and David Moore. This is a picture book of Finnish design as seen through the eyes and lenses of two foreign photographers, an American and an Australian. They cover everything from the Temppeliaukio ("Rock") church in Helsinki to designs inspired by Finnish nature, in color. It's beautiful! Dewey # 745.4 Fi.

SAARINEN HOUSE AND GARDEN edited by Gregory Wittkopp. The Saarinen house at Cranbrook has been described as "one of the most significant houses built in America during the 1920s". This is a beautifully illustrated publication of this "Total Work of Art", which is the subtitle given this work. Dewey # 728 Sa.

THE WINTER WAR, a video of this well-known but terrible time in Finnish history, told from a soldier's point of view. It's on our video and DVD shelf, Dewey number 947.1 Wi.
