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CHAIRMAN'S CORNER

I would like to share with you the FCA relationship with Armitage Caterers because they are such an important part of our operations.

Armitage has been our caterer for four years and Linda Armitage and Laura Ingram are the owners. We do not have a written contract with them but we do have an understanding. They act as our Event Coordinators for any rental of our facility and act as our primary marketing agent for securing rentals. We charge a renter a basic price for the facility. Armitage sets the price for the food of which the FCA receives 33% of that fee. It is Armitage's food service license that allows the FCA to cook and serve food to renters at our facility. Armitage maintains the paper products and staples for the kitchen.

We give Armitage exclusive rights to provide food for rentals at the FCA and they often assist us with food for our cultural and social events. Armitage in turn promises the FCA priority service when a rental requires food. We allow Armitage the use of our kitchen for events they cater exclusive of the FCA.

We find this arrangement to be very favorable to the FCA and we believe to Armitage as well. This is as it should be.

FINLAND TODAY

First, anti-smoking laws have become tougher the last few years in Finland. Some of the recent laws that have taken effect are: can't sell cigarettes to minors; no smoking in public places; no cigarette advertisements.

But a new tougher proposal is coming up in the Finnish Parliament. In the longer term the new proposal will say: "The Finnish government aims to phase out smoking completely in the next 30 years."

But in the near future the new proposal will say:

- 1. By spring of this year, smokers in Finland will only be able to buy tobacco by asking for cigarettes from under the counter.
- 2. Tobacco vending machines will be phased out over the next three years.
- 3. It will be illegal to smoke in a car carrying passengers under the age of 18. The details of the long-term policy have not been spelled out.

The Finnish cell phone manufacturer and electronic giant, Nokia, had a pretty good year in 2009. Their gross sales in 2009 was about \$16.8 billion. World wide they sold about 126.9 million cell phones last year. Nokia's share of the world cell phone market stayed about the same, 39%.

Young Finnish college age workers are much in demand in....Paris, France. Disneyland Resort Paris to be exact. Disneyland Resort Paris employs about 2000 summer time workers between April and September, and about 10% are from Finland. Disney officials say that the young Finns are in demand because of language skills and work ethic.

Finland's equivalent of the Oscar is the "Jussi" award. At the recently held Jussi awards in Helsinki, the big winner was the movie, "Letters to Father Jacob." Father Jacob won the Jussi for the "best film", "best director", "best music score", and Heikki Nousiainen won the Jussi for the "best actor".

The "Jussi" awards are the oldest movie awards in Europe, first presented in 1944.

The four Finnish stunt men, The Dudesons, have signed a new multi-million dollar contract with music TV channel, MTV. The Dudesons have been on MTV for 3 seasons doing dangerous stunts, wild pranks, and inflicting pain on each other. The new MTV show will be called The Dudesons in America.

The rights to the Dudesons three previous seasons have been sold to over 50 countries.

The Dudesons series originated on the Finnish commercial Channel Four (Nelonen).

What do these have in common: Eppu Normali, Popeda, Yo, Mamba, Dingo, and Maarit? They are 1980's Finnish rock groups that now are on a series postage stamps called "Suomi-Rock".

WHY DO FINNS IN THE UP CLAIM THE PASTY?

In Cornwall, England, mining has been a way of life for over a thousand years. Cornish men picked tin and copper from the ground long before written history and by the 15th century, they had learned to harvest the ores buried deep in the ground. When the tin and copper mines failed in Cornwall during the mid-1800s, many Cornish men and women immigrated to the mining frontiers of North America. Some settled in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan to work in the newly discovered copper mines. Not only did they bring the knowledge and experience necessary to extract the rich veins of copper that lay hidden deep within the earth, they brought their traditional lunch bucket fare, the pasty, which was well suited to eating in the mines.

A small influx of Finnish immigrants followed the Cornish miners in 1864. These Finns (and many other ethnic groups) adopted the pasty for use in the Copper Country copper mines. About 30 years later, a much larger flood of Finnish immigrants found their countrymen baking pasties, and assumed that it was a Finnish invention. The pasty resembles the Finnish foods, piirakka and lalakukko, so when the new Finns saw their countrymen carrying it in a pail, they thought that it was the Finns who invented the pasty. As a result, the pasty has become strongly associated with Finnish culture in this area.

The FCA carries on this Finnish-American tradition by baking and selling pasties from an original Finnish UP recipe. The next opportunity to participate in this hallowed event is Saturday, March 13. Call in your orders to the FCA or email them to FCA-pasties@comcast.net. There is also a signup sheet in the FCA lobby. The cost is \$5 each and pasty orders must be picked up at the FCA between noon and 4:00 p.m. on Saturday the 13th.

As always, volunteer pasty makers are needed on either Friday the 12th or Saturday the 13th. Call the FCA office or sign up on the sheet in the FCA lobby.

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

It seems that finally people other than Finnish Americans are becoming aware of the architecturally talented Saarinen family. The latest TIME magazine carries a 2-page article about Eero, giving him high praise. And of course there is the forthcoming documentary about Eero, which Paul Potti mentioned in the last newsletter.

The Saarinen family is worth more attention than I can give in one article. Therefore, this month's article will deal with father Eliel, and next month we'll visit Eero.

Gottlieb Eliel Saarinen was born on August 20, 1873 in Rantasalmi, Finland, where his father was a clergyman. When the young Eliel (as he was always known) reached school age, his desire was to become a painter. However, when he enrolled in the Technical Institute in Helsinki in the autumn of 1893, he simultaneously enrolled in the Department of Architectre at the University of Helsinki for courses in drawing. Here he soon realized that architecture was where his interest and ability lay; furthermore, it seemed a more meaningful and creative pursuit.

While still in school, he and two other students, Armas Lindgren and Herman Gesellius, established an architectural firm in Helsinki which in a few years was the leading firm of modern Finnish architecture. They won the competition for the Finnish pavilion in the 1900 World's Fair in Paris. The creation was a sensation; Akseli Gallen-Kallela did the ceiling frescoes based on Kalevala scenes. In October 1900 the firm was to have been presented the Medal of the Legion of Honor, but the Russian government would not permit this award to be presented to the Finns.

In 1902 the firm won the competition for a national museum to be built in Helsinki. Many other projects were handled by the firm, but perhaps the most famous is the Helsinki Railway Station, completed in 1914, said to be one of the most beautiful railroad stations in the world. The work was mainly Saarinen's.

In 1922 Saarinen entered the international competition for the Chicago Tribune Tower, submitting a sketch which won second prize. It has been agreed that his sketch should have been the winner. However, it was not forgotten; it became the model for several U.S. skyscrapers. It was this event that brought the Saarinens to the U.S. Eliel left Finland in 1923, intending to visit colleagues, but two months later he was joined by his wife Loja and their children, Eero, thirteen, and Pipsan (Eva-Lisa), eighteen, and they established permanent residence here.

Saarinen was asked to join the staff of the University of Michigan. Here he was introduced to George G. Booth, who was interested in building an art academy in Bloomfield Hills. The Saarinens decided to take on the project. The en-

tire family collaborated on many of the projects. Loja designed rugs, curtains and upholstery, working for a year supervising a dozen weavers. Pipsan decorated the auditorium and ballroom interiors; Eero designed furniture.

In 1923 Saarinen was appointed president of Cranbrook; he served until 1948. During his tenure at Cranbrook he was involved in many architectural projects nationwide, one of the most acclaimed being Christ Lutheran church in Minneapolis.

Eliel Saarinen died in 1950. It was his wish to be buried in the soil of his native land. His ashes were taken to Hviträsk, their summer home in Finland, near Helsinki. The place is now a museum.

Loja survived her husband by eighteen years. She is buried beside her husband at Hviträsk.

If you wish to learn more about Eliel Saarinen, do seek out the following in our library:

ELIEL SAARINEN by Albert Christ-Janer. This is the English translation and revised version of the original work by Christ-Janer published in 1948, two years before his death. Both Eliel and his wife Loja approved of this publication; it may be regarded as his official biography. It places the elder Saarinen in the historical context in which he grew up in Finland and which subsequently produced his architecture. You will find it in biography, B Sa.
