VIOLIN AND ORGAN CONCERT

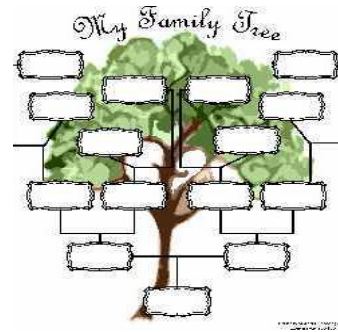

GENEALOGY 101 AND 102



On April 10, the Finnish American Historical Society sponsored a fascinating presentation by Dr. Paul Lehto on how he has carried out his family genealogy study for over 20 years. His very useful workshop, Genealogy 101, provided many resources that people can use in their own family searches: a "Finnish-American Genealogy Cheat Sheet" published by the Finnish American Heritage Center; the Mormon Church microfilms; Finland's national archives, in Helsinki; federal and state census data; Michigan Technological University library archives; Finland's Institute of Migration; and Ellis Island immigrant records, among others.

If you missed his April workshop, you can still learn what you need to know to start on your family project. Set aside **Sunday, October 23**, at 2:00 pm in the Main Hall, for "Adventures in Discovery" Genealogy 102. Dr. Lehto will continue to share his successful strategies.

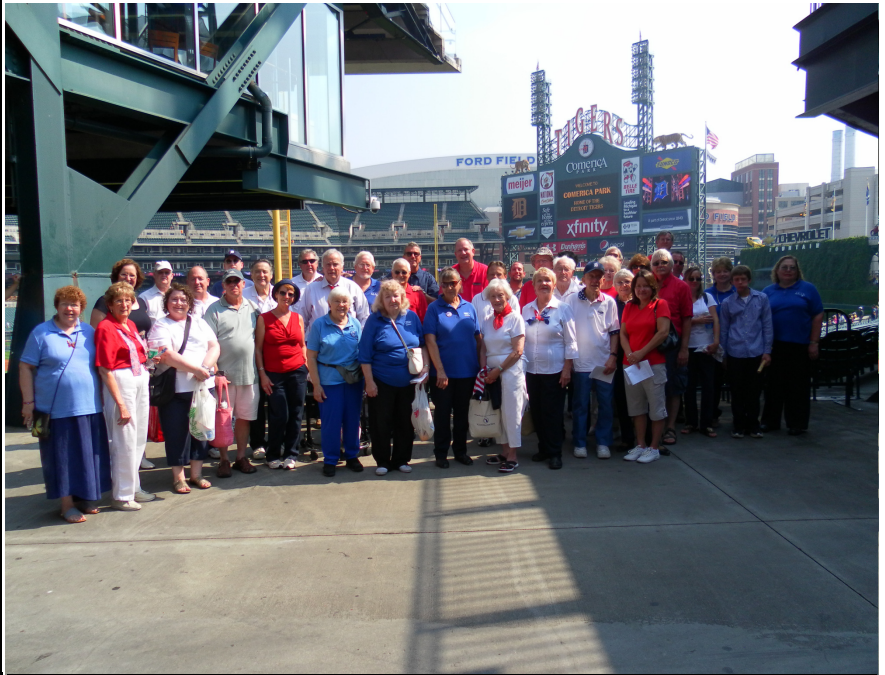

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY



Finland has more collected proverbs than any other country. They are housed in the archives of the Finnish Literary Society in Helsinki. Although the use of proverbs has decreased in modern Finnish society, there are those who do not want them to be forgotten.

Proverbs were more common among the common people, who had one on the tip of the tongue for any occasion. We can learn much about a society from its proverbs: what they considered right and wrong, what behavior was acceptable, their attitudes toward work, their superiors, and so much more.

Finnish proverbs seem to fall into categories of three different kinds: simile (vertaus), quotation (lainaus), proverb (sananlasku or sananparsi). A few examples of each follow. First, here are some examples of similes (statements that use “like” or “as”).

Niin se kulkee kun täi tervassa. (He moves as slowly as a louse in tar.)

Hävis kun tuhka tuuleen. (Disappeared like ashes into the wind.)

On niin kuin olis yhden syönyt ja toista aikoo. (Looks like he’s eaten one and intends to eat another. This refers to one who is irritable, moody, angry.)

Then, there are many that are in the form of quotations:

“Puhtaus on hyvä,” sano suutari kun käänsi paitansa nurinpäin. (“Cleanliness is good,” said the cobbler as he turned his shirt inside out!)

“Ei paljo puutukkaa, kun hevoosta ja kolomia kenkää”, sanoo poika kun tiältä hevoosenkengän löytyi. (South Ostrobothnian dialect) “I lack nothing but a horse and three more horse shoes”, said the young lad when he found one horse shoe.

“Paholaesen keohkot” sano körttiäijä haitaria. (North Ostrobothnian dialect) “Devil’s lungs” said

the Pietist regarding an accordion. The illustration shows him destroying it. They regarded accordion music (used for accompanying dancing), as sinful.

Finally there is the category of which we would say “proverbially speaking”, a saying, a byword:

Ensi lempi ja ensi lumi harvoin pysyvät. (The first snow and a first love are seldom permanent.)

Syötä vierasta sanoilla kunnes keitto kerkeävi. (Feed your guest with words until the soup (or meal) is ready.)

Ei vahinko tule kello kaulassa. (An accident doesn’t come with bells on, or doesn’t announce itself beforehand.)

Would you like to read more proverbs? We have the following books of proverbs in our library:

FINNISH PROVERBS. Translated by Inkeri Väänänen-Jensen. These are Finnish proverbs translated into English (does not include the Finnish). Included are tidbits of information about Finland, with illustrations.

ETELÄ-KARJALAN SANANPARSIA. These are proverbs gathered from southeastern Finland. They are divided into categories, such as proverbs about the seasons, the church and the devil, relatives, the rich vs. the poor, etc. They are in the dialect of that region.

SANANLASKUT. Contains 15,904 proverbs from the archives of the Finnish Literary Society. In Finnish, these are arranged alphabetically by topic.

VANHAN KANSAN SANANLASKUVIISAUS. Koonnut (gathered by) ja järjestänyt (arranged by) Matti Kuusi. Matti Kuusi (1914-1998) was a famous Finnish folklorist and collector of proverbs. These are also topically arranged.

YHESSÄ NYTYISSÄ. By Erkki Tanttu. One proverb per page in dialect, with illustration.

ASIASTA TOISEEN. By Erkki Tanttu. More of the same as above.

Finland Today



First, the new \$271 million Helsinki Music Center opened its doors on the last day of August after construction began nearly a decade ago, but was delayed for various reasons. At the official opening ceremony, Finnish Prime Minister Jyrki Katainen said: "The Music Center lays a foundation for Finnish culture and art to grow and become stronger."

The center was dreamed up by Finnish architectural firm, LPR, while the main concert hall was designed by the famous Japanese acoustic designer, Yasuhisa Toyota. The nearly round concert hall seats 1,704 people and allows some of the audience to sit somewhat behind the orchestra. The Finnish Radio Symphony Orchestra played the works of Jean Sibelius and Igor Stravinski for inaugural program. Orchestra members said that the acoustics of the new hall were: "Stunning and allowed the orchestra to play with much greater subtlety and sensitivity."

The summer of 2011 was exceptionally warm in Finland. As a matter of fact, it was the 4th warmest since 1900. The number of "hot days", when the temperature goes above 25C (77F), was 46, which is eight more than normal. The highest temperature, 91F, in Finland during the summer was of all places in western Lapland in Ylitornio in June. You may remember that the all time high temperature in Finland was set last summer in Joensuu, 98.6F.

Finland has won the GameBook Cup, the largest nation to nation (Sweden v Finland) golf tournament in the world. People competed head to head in seven different categories, of which the Finns won 4, the Swedes won 2, and one ended in a tie. Approximately 3,000 rounds of golf were played during the tournament.

Finns dominated at the 86th International Six Days Enduro motorcycle races held at Kotka, Finland. All six Finnish men posted superb times as Team Finland won the World FIM Trophy, Spain was second, while the U.S. came in third.

At this year's Mobile Phone Throwing World Championships held in Savonlinna, Finland, both the men's and women's divisions were won by Finns. For the men, Oskari Heinonen won with a toss of 249 feet, while Netti Karvinen took the women's title with a throw of 157.5 feet.

And finally, Heikki, the Ol' Northwoods Sage says, "I'm Rich! I got: Silver in the Hair, Gold in the Teeth, Crystals in the Kidneys, Sugar in the Blood, Iron in the Arteries, Lead in the Butt, and...An inexhaustible supply of Natural Gas."
