If a donation is undesignated, it goes to the General Fund for expenses of the Center.


The family of the deceased may direct undesignated donations toward a specific fund (up to one year after date of death).

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY



If your forefathers came from Finland but didn't come from Oulunlääni, it is quite possible that they came from Vaasanlääni, for most of the Finnish immigrants came from one of those provinces. The capitol of Vaasanlääni is Vaasa. The people of Vaasa claim that their city is the sunniest city in Finland.

Vaasa is situated about halfway up the west coast of Finland on the Gulf of Bothnia. The town of Vaasa can trace its history back to the 1300's. Already in the 1370's the Korsholm Castle existed there. There is hardly a trace of it anymore. In 1606 Charles IX founded the town around the oldest harbor and trading point in Ostrobothnia and named it Wasa after the Swedish royal house. The town received its charter in 1765. It became very prosperous from the exports of tar, pitch, grain, butter, hides and timber. In 1765 the first library in all of Finland was established in Vaasa.

Disaster struck in 1852 when a careless visitor dropped a lighted pipe on a straw mattress; by that night only smoldering ruins remained of the town. A new town, designed by C.A. Setterberg, was built nearer the coast, which had receded because the land in those parts is rising from the sea at the rate of one meter per century.

During the Finnish Civil War, Vaasa became the administrative capitol of the country from January 29 - May 3, 1918. The Socialist militia had seized control of Helsinki and the Senate was compelled to move. Also, Mannerheim established his head-quarters there. To commemorate this time, a Statue of Liberty stands in the market square.

Vaasa has a current population of approximately 58,000. Most of the people are bilingual (for a third of the population Swedish is their first language.) Persons serving the public are usually fluent in German and English as well.

Vaasa is an active industrial community, producing electrical equipment, heavy machinery, plastic products, footwear and clothing, as well as grain and flour products.

A visitor will find plenty of attractions. There are eight public beaches, as well as tennis, golf, squash, bowling, and horseback riding; the marina accommodates incoming guests. A day's trip to Sweden is a possibility; the shortest route between Finland and Sweden is the Vaasa/Umea ferry. You can charter a boat and go fishing for whitefish and herring. Or you can board one of the many tourist boats that will take you sightseeing. Those interested in amusement parks have their choice of two: Tropiclandia and Waslandia. The first one is an indoor and outdoor water park with indoor and outdoor wild water slides, waterfall, bubble baths and saunas. Waslandia offers a full day's action for all the family with dozens of rides and other attractions. If you would like a city tour, that can easily be arranged; tours leave the City Hall daily. Or you can hire your own tour guide from the Information Office there.

You will want to see the ruins of Old Vaasa, the site of the old Korsholm Castle, as well as Mustasaari Church, which was the Court of Appeals until the fire, when it became a church and has remained so to this day. While there, observe the beautifully tended veterans' cemetery in front of the church. Don't miss the museums: the Ostrobothnia Museum with 20,000 items of peasant as well as upper class culture and the Brage Open-air Museum, which specializes in Swedish peasant culture, and also has a section on seal-hunting. In addition, you can visit the Stundars Handicraft Village and a car and motor museum.

Vaasa is a good place to shop. There is an active *tori* as well as conveniently located department stores, markets and specialty shops. The South Ostrobothnians are famous for their hand woven goods -- everything from rugs to tablecloths. The area has long been known for its tinsmiths who make, among other things, dishes, measuring cups, candle holders and cake tins.

Vaasa can be reached conveniently by plane, train or bus, or a rental car if you prefer.

Mike Grant served another fine meal and good fellowship was enjoyed by all.



Finland Today



First, the Moody's Investment Services has confirmed that it was maintaining Finland's AAA rating. That left Finland as the only Euro Zone country with the AAA rating. Earlier Moody had said that it had downgraded Germany's and the Netherland's ratings.

Mikko Spolander, financial advisor in Finland's Ministry of Finance said: "This is a positive sign of confidence by the rating agencies in how Finland is managing its economic policies." But Spolander also added: "We are very export-oriented and any negative development in the Euro Zone would affect Finland, so we can't be too complacent."

The AAA rating makes it easier and cheaper for the government to borrow money because of the perceived low risk of defaulting on its debt.

Research done at the University of Eastern Finland has opened the way for earlier diagnosis for Alzheimer's disease. The study shows that early phase of the disease can be seen by the changes in protein in the spinal fluid. The onset of Alzheimer disease begins in the brain about 20 years before the first symptoms become apparent. By the time symptoms appear, irreversible nerve damage has already taken place. This discovery about the spinal fluids will be useful in development of early treatments for the disease, before the symptoms become apparent.

Google is spending \$177 million to expand its data center in Finland. The data center is located in an old paper mill in Hamina which is in the south east of Finland. The data center will have many "green" innovations including using the sea water from the ocean for cooling the facilities.

Nokia has announced that it will be closing its last manufacturing plant in Finland, in Salo. The 780 employees at the plant are part of the 10,000 positions worldwide that Nokia will cut by the end of 2013.

Where is Finland's "geometric population median", or its population midpoint? If you include the Aland Islands, the midpoint is in the town of Siikalatva, which is near Hameenlinna. But, if you only go by the "main land of Finland", the midpoint is located only a few kilometers north of Siikalatva in the town of Puolanka. From 1970 onward, Finland's population center has moved south, about a kilometer a year. If you want the exact location of Finland's population midpoint, it is located in a barley field on the Tarvainen's family manor called the Hovikartano.

And finally, Heikki climbs to the top of Mt Arvon, the highest peak in Michigan, so he can be closer to

God. When he gets to the top he asks: "Lord, can You hear me?"


