FROM THE FCA LIBRARY



Your librarian is on sick leave; therefore we are rerunning a column from April, 2009.

The first time I saw a Finnish Easter card, I thought it was a Halloween card; it had a witch on it! This led to research regarding the Easter witch; it had no connection with Halloween, which is not celebrated in Finland.

Finnish Easter has two influences. The Lutheran tradition leans more toward the Scandinavian, while the Karelians of southeast Finland and some of the province of Savo still retain much of the Russian Orthodox influence. The Russian Orthodox are extremely religious; for them Easter is an even more important holy day than Christmas.

Some Easter traditions are carryovers from pagan times. Although Lutheran Finland no longer observes the fast imposed by the Catholic church, many of the prohibitions were retained by the peasants; these became enmeshed with folk superstitions and traditions. One of these traditions has to do with witches.

In olden days peasants believed that wicked witches were about during the period from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. It was believed that evil spirits were out in especially full force from Good Friday to Easter morning, because the Savior was sealed up in his tomb.

The witch is still retained in Finnish Easter tradition in fun. On Easter Eve, children dressed as witches travel from door to door, hoping for treats, usually collected in a copper pot.

The Orthodox have long had the custom of giving decorated eggs as gifts at Easter; however, this custom wasn't widespread in the rest of Finland until this century. Now eggs figure prominently in Finnish Easter tradition. Some are the real thing; others are made of chocolate or marzipan. They are used both as a breakfast treats as well as decoration.

Another decoration is an "Easter tree." A branch of willow is brought indoors and "forced" to bud. Then it is placed in a pot or other holder, and dec-

orated with colored feathers, colored blown eggs, and sometimes witches and/or birds.

In most of Finland, Easter is not considered a time for a "Fashion parade"; (that is reserved for May Day.) However, in Lapland everyone looks forward to Easter, when they will wear their best clothes and visit the nearest village. They come to shop, and perhaps sell a few reindeer. They also look forward to visiting with their neighbors, whom they may not have seen for months. They go to church, and this is often the time when weddings and baptisms take place. There may be games including competitions involving lassoing of reindeer. There will probably be a lot of talk, and also singing to help make up for the lonely life they usually know.

There is no traditional meat that is served on Easter throughout Finland; however, mämmi, a baked rye pudding, is traditional in all parts of the country except Karelia. In olden days it was baked in birch bark baskets; however, today it is illegal to strip bark off birch trees, so a substitute container must be used. There are almost as many recipes for "mammi" as there are Finns, and the consistency varies from one part of the country to another. In one region it is so thin that It has to be drunk from a cup, but the most common consistency is that of a baked pudding. In Karelia the traditional Easter dessert is "pasha," a molded cheese like dessert.

If you wish to read more about Finnish Easter, or other Finnish holidays, you will find information in FINNISH FOLK YEAR by Anneke Lipsanen in our library. A recipe for mämmi as well as pasha can be found in THE FINNISH COOKBOOK, by Beatrice Ojakangas, also in our library.

Finland Today



First, "In the execution of my office as President I will sincerely and faithfully observe the Constitution and laws of the Republic, and to the best of my ability promote the success of the Finnish people." With that short statement, Sauli Vainamo Ninisto, 63 became Finland's 12th President. "I would like to thank you President Tarja Halonen, for your valuable efforts for the benefit of the Finish people and your contribution toward international security and cooperation. Your work has laid down an excellent path for us to follow". And so began President Ninisto's inaugural address.

Finland now has three living Presidents, each having achieved a "first". Finland's 11th President, 2000-2012, Tarja Halonen was the first female President. The 10th President, Martti Oiva Kalevi Ahtisaari, was the first President elected in direct public vote. Mauno Nenrik Koivisto, 1982-2000, was the first President to be born in independent Finland. What all three former Presidents have in common is that they all are members of the Social Democratic Party (SCP). The new President, Sauli Ninisto, is a member of the National Coalition Party (NCP).

To upgrade their F18 fighter jets, Finland and the U.S. have reached an agreement where the Finnish Air Force will purchase JASSM missiles (Joint Air to Surface Standoff Missiles) for about \$193 million. This makes the whole F18 Hornet purchase worth \$931 million. The missiles will be built by the Lockheed-Martin Company.

Akler Artic Technology of Finland will design the Canadian Coast Guard's future Flagship ice breaker, the CCGS John G. Diefenbaker. The ice breaker will accommodate a crew of 100, with space for an additional 25 people. The ship will be able to operate independently for up to 270 days, and go through ice about 8 feet thick at three knots an hour. The ship will be built at the Vancouver shipyard. The Helsinki based Artic Technology has designed over half of the world's ice breakers, as well as Artic and Antarctic research vessels.

Nokia to cut 40,000 jobs, mostly in Europe, and move them, mostly to Asia. According to Stephen Elop, CEO, Nokia will close production at plants in Hungary (2,300 jobs), Mexico (700 jobs), and at it's oldest plant in Salo, Finland (1,000 jobs). Nokia will build new plants in Vietnam and Brazil. Nokia has nine plants world-wide, including one in Dongguon, China, that makes one-third of its phones. Since its partnership with Microsoft, Nokia has lost 52% of its stock value, down to \$19 million.

The latest sports in Finland? It's lawn mower racing on ice. The Third Annual Grand Prix was held in Jarvenpaa. The lawn mower racing has up to now been mainly a British sport, but the Finns have "kicked up a notch", by racing on ice. The latest competition in Jarvenpaa was won by an Estonian team going around the frozen course about 30 mph, completing 126 laps in three hours.

And finally, Heikki feels newly empowered after reading the book entitled, "You Can Be The Man of the House." Finding new courage that he never knew he had, Heikki storms into the kitchen where his wife, Hilma was working, and announces to her, "From now on, you need to know that I am the man of this house and my word is "Law."
