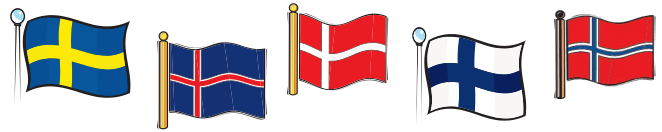
Holiday decorations are now in place and we hope you will have an opportunity to come by and see our efforts.

GLENDA DAWN GOSS TO PRESENT AT 95TH CELEBRATION OF FINLAND'S INDEPENDENCE

Plan to hear the 2012 Finlandia Foundation National Lecturer of the Year, Glenda Dawn Goss, on Sunday, December 9, at the Finnish Center. She is a prominent Sibelius scholar and musicologist, who for many years was a professor at the University of Georgia, and now teaches at the Sibelius Academy in Helsinki. You will find her most recent book, published in 2009, *Sibelius: A Composer's Life and the Awakening of Finland*, in the Finnish Center library. As a non-Finn, she brings what she calls an "outsider's perspective" to the study and understanding of Jean Sibelius and to the development of the Finnish nation. Her presentation about "Finland's Golden Age" in art and music will include sound recordings, literary excerpts, and artistic illustrations. The program will culminate with an orchestral version of Sibelius's "Finlandia," performed on accordion by Don Reinholm, music director of the Finnish Center's Soittoniekat/FinnFolk band.

In addition to Ms. Goss's presentation, there will be a respectful remembrance of Finnish war veterans and Lottas. The honorary Finnish consul and local Finnish foreign exchange high school students will be introduced, and music will be provided by Soittoniekat/FinnFolk. The program begins at 2:00 pm, and ends with a social hour, with coffee table offerings provided by the Finnish American Historical Society of Michigan. Admission is \$10 for adults, and free for young children and students through the university level.

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY



A new exhibit at the Detroit Institute of Arts has prompted us to order two new books for the library. Starting October 14, through January 21, the DIA will be featuring “Faberge’: the Rise and Fall” with about 225 of the fabulous Faberge’ creations on display, including several of the famous Easter eggs ordered by the czars.

The goldsmith, designer and jeweler Peter Carl Faberge’ was born on May 30, 1846, in St. Petersburg, Russia. He made the House of Faberge’ an internationally known name with fantastical bejeweled decorative objects. His workshop began creating the famous imperial Easter eggs for the czars Alexander III and Nicholas II in 1885.

It is a little known fact that several of the Faberge’ goldsmiths were Finns. After 1809, when Finland became a grand duchy in the Russian empire, Finnish goldsmiths looked for opportunities in Russia, where they found work as apprentices and artists in the Faberge’ studio. Of the 20 or so Faberge’ work masters, 14 were Finnish. They were appreciated for their exactness and conscientiousness. Of the three Faberge’ head work masters, two, Erik August Kollin and Henrik Wigström, were Finns.

This year the Mint of Finland will commemorate Finnish goldsmiths at the request of the Ministry of Finance by producing a collector coin. “We are proud to be able to bring out the goldsmith’s craft in Finland in the collector coin. Faberge’ work master Henrik Wigström was responsible for the manufacture of the world’s most famous collector items and Finnish goldsmiths today continue to uphold comparable skills.” This year marks the 150th anniversary of Wigström’s birth. The DIA exhibit includes a number of hard stone animals of exquisite design; nearly all of them were produced under Wigström’s supervision.

The most famous pieces produced by the Faberge’ workshops are the Easter eggs. The first one was ordered by Czar Alexander in 1885 for his wife as an Easter gift. This so thrilled her that he continued the gifting of an egg every Easter until his death. His son Nicholas II carried on the tradition

until 1916. Each egg required approximately a year to create and inside of each was an incredible surprise of bejeweled objects or intricately designed articles of dozens of kinds, including a royal carriage! The surprise was kept a strict secret until receipt of the egg by the giftee. Of the 50 eggs made for the imperial family, 42 have survived. Several of them are in the DIA exhibit. Prepare to be awestruck!

After the Russian Revolution, the Bolsheviks shut down the House of Faberge’, and the family fled the country. Faberge’ died in Lausanne, France on September 24, 1920. The Finnish goldsmiths fled back to their native country but lived in obscurity. These were difficult times in Finland for repatriates from St. Petersburg. Relations with the Soviet Union were anything but friendly, so people talking about their former life and work in Russia were treated with suspicion. At age 56 Henrik Wigström retreated almost empty-handed to his summer home in Finland. He died in 1923.

For those interested in reading more about Faberge’ and his incredible craft we are adding to our collection two books: FABERGE’ AND THE RUSSIAN MASTER GOLDSMITHS by Gerald Hill and two Russian co-authors, and FABERGE’S EGGS by Toby Faber.

Those who want to see a collection of the actual objects should head to the DIA at 5200 Woodward, phone (313) 833-4005. Exhibit tickets, which are timed, are \$15 for adults, \$8 for children. Regular museum admission (not including the exhibit) is free for tri-county residents. Hours are 10-4 Wed-Thu; 10-10 Fri, 10-5 Sat & Sun (Beginning November 13, the museum is open 9-4 Tues.)

FINNISH AMERICAN SINGERS

Our Christmas concert on SATURDAY, DECEMBER 15, 2 pm is fast approaching and the singers are practicing Monday evenings to ensure listeners a wonderful, nostalgic experience. As always, we welcome new voices and would love to see you at rehearsal! If that's not your forte, please be a listener at our concert.

One of the pieces we are singing combines several Christmas favorites. Some of the song titles or phrases from the music introduce you to Anna Kimler this month. Anna is a lovely, German born soprano and the mother of Vickie, introduced last month in this column. She grew up singing in Germany and just kept singing after arriving in the United States in 1951 with her parents to join uncles here. She and her husband, Victor, sang in several choral groups for many years, joining the FAS about 30 years ago. After her husband's death in 2009 and a hiatus from the group, Anna returned with her daughter, a quiet presence in the front row.

~ I love Christmas – "Quiet moments I recall"~ Anna said these lyrics remind her of the one Christmas Eve during WW II when all of the fighting and bombing stopped as soldiers on both sides sang familiar Christmas carols, briefly enjoying peace on earth. Anna was a child during WW II and in 1944, while her father was in the army, left Frankfurt with her mother to go to their aunt's in the country, pulling a small wagon with the possessions they were able to gather after their home was bombed. *~We Need a Little Christmas Now~* They celebrated Christmas simply by creating handwork (knitting, crochet, stitching, baking) to give as gifts. Anna still knits up a storm! Each woman had their baking specialty and she sighed when talking about the spritz and butter cookies. *~It's Beginning to Look a Lot Like Christmas!* ~ Children had to wait until Christmas Eve to be delighted by a decorated Christmas tree. Presents were also opened that evening in preparation for the arrival of the Christ Child. But children everywhere love to press their faces against special store window Christmas scenes, fascinated with the happy world created there. *~Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree, Holly Jolly Christmas, Frosty the Snowman~* Anna loved to visit a small bookstore in Frankfurt that always filled their window with wonders. A childhood friend told her that store is still there and still decorating for the season.

After marrying Victor Kimler, and living just down the street from her parents in Detroit, they followed the German tradition of celebrating the Christkind on Christmas Eve with children, parents and grandparents and a wonderful fish dinner. Gathering the next day, their extended family saw goose as the main course. *~Chestnuts Roasting on an Open Fire~* They savored lebkuchen, a rich, spicy gingerbread cookie or cake. Although winter poses challenges these days, Anna loves the quiet, snow covered landscape *~Let It Snow, Let It Snow, Let It Snow~* and the beauty of thick, fluffy snowflakes falling. She is thankful for her blessings and wishes all of us a serene Christ-filled season. *~"Give me no grand and golden thing this blessed Christmas tide"~*

FINLAND TODAY



Do you remember that old saying: An apple a day will keep the doctor away? A study done in Finland has suggested that you can also add "tomato" to that saying. The study done with more than 1000 men over a 12-year period, showed a reduced risk of stroke for the men who ate a tomato-rich diet. Says Jouni Karppi from the University of Eastern Finland in Kuopio, "This study adds to the evidence that a diet high in fruits and vegetables is associated with a lower risk for stroke." Dr. Clair Walton from the Stroke Association says, "This study suggests that a diet with anti-oxidants such as lycopene, which is found in foods such as tomatoes, red peppers, and watermelons, could help to lower the stroke risk."

While the U.S. and the rest of the world's nuclear power countries are in a political struggle as to where to build their "final solution" to their nuclear waste, Finland is busy building its nuclear waste site. When the site opens up in 2020, on the island of Olkiluoto on the western coast of Finland, it will be the world's first "final solution" waste site. Olkiluoto already has two nuclear power plants on it, a third plant, the world's largest, is under construction, and a fourth one is being planned. The two nuclear power plants on Olkiluoto currently provide 17% of Finland's electric power. The waste site on Olkiluoto will be about 1,400 feet below ground level in solid rock and will have enough room for 12,000 tons of nuclear waste, which is enough room to operate and close all the current and planned nuclear plants.

The Nordic countries of Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden have signed agreements to share military transport planes. The pool of planes include 16 C-130 Hercules and three other smaller transport planes. Iceland doesn't have any transport planes, but plans to give money for future purchases. The countries also agreed to share radar surveillance facilities and other ground equipment. There are no concrete plans at present to share any of the countries' fighter jets. The pooling of military resources is seen as a way to cut costs while maintaining operational capabilities.

Wartsila Marine received their biggest contract ever from a Mid Eastern country. Wartsila is building 28 marine engines and propulsion systems for 14 new tug boats being built in Romania. The ships being built include nine 80-ton Bollard Pull tugs and five 50-ton BP tugs. They are being built for the Kuwait Oil Refinery and will be used in their oil terminal. In addition to the engines and propulsion systems, the contract also includes Wartsila's Condition Based Maintenance (CBM). The CBM provides remote condition monitoring of the engines which enables accurate and cost-efficient predictive maintenance.

And finally, Heikki goes to see his psychiatrist and says, "Doctor, my young, beautiful, sexy wife is unfaithful to me. Every evening she goes to the Dog House Tavern and picks up men.
