The oldest tradition is to use dyed and painted chicken eggs, but a modern custom is to substitute chocolate eggs, or plastic eggs filled with confectionery such as jelly beans.

APRIL IN THE GARDENS

Honestly, who knows what anyone is really going to be doing in the gardens in April a month ahead? I'm a professional and I'm not sure that I will be visiting my customers' gardens with all this snow still on the ground so let's just concentrate on March. The Flea Market is on March 28 and 29 and the Garden Club will have a table with many garden club related items for sale. Our special raffle item is a bird house with a wood burned figure of a bird on the front so please stop by our table and support the club with a purchase.

The Garden Club has also been in talks with Waste Management looking at ways to go Greener. As some of you may already know the Garden Club captures over 900 gallons at a time of rain water to utilize in watering the vegetable plots we rent. We also compost waste from the kitchen to make compost soil for the gardens. The wetlands and swale with their native plants take runoff from the driveway and filter impurities slowing their progression into the adjacent waterway system. We are proposing to add two recycle bins like those at nearby residential sites to the Finnish Center to recycle paper. plastics #1-7, cans, and glass. The cost would be \$35 per month. We have approached Senior Housing to add an additional two bins at that site for no additional cost and perhaps split the cost between the two sites.

Meanwhile before the snow melts, take a look at the tracks around the woodshop and wetlands. You will see deer, birds, coyote, rabbits, and squirrels tracks. If you see cars near the woodshop on Monday morning, please drop by and join us in our projects, to chat, or have a cup of coffee.



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FROM THE FCA LIBRARY



Easter is just around the corner, so let's take a look at Easter festivities in Finland. Like in other Christian countries, the Easter traditions in Finland have both pagan and Christian elements.

On Palm Sunday, or on Easter Sunday (sometimes on Holy Saturday), depending upon the part of Finland one is speaking of, children dressed as witches may appear at your door. Years ago, people believed that evil spirits were abroad while Jesus was in the grave. Witches (called *trulli* in Finnish) were believed to fly around on broomsticks. Now this has evolved into a fun activity for children, who go from door to door dressed as witches, offering a blessing for your home in return for some treats.

The witches recite a traditional rhyme at the door: Virvon, varvon, tuoreeks, terveeks, tulevaks vuodeks; vitsa sulle, palkka mulle. (Translation: I wave a twig for a fresh and healthy year ahead; a twig for you, a treat for me.) They offer a willow twig decorated with colorful feathers and crepe paper. It would be a good idea to have a basket of sweets or small change at your door in anticipation of these visitors.



Another custom is an Easter tree. A branch of willow is brought indoors and forced to bud. It is placed in a pot or other holder and decorated with colored feathers, colored blown eggs, and sometimes witches or birds. Some families sow grass in small pots before Easter, and put eggs in them when the grass has grown sufficiently.



The religious aspect of Easter is found especially in music. Sacred music concerts are organized during the Easter season, especially for Good Friday. Bach's *The Passion of St. Matthew* and *The Passion of St. John* are the most attended concerts of the holidays. The texts of these are based on the account of the Passion and Death of Jesus according to the gospels of Saint John and Saint Matthew. These concerts often attract more people to church than does the Easter morning service.

Compared to Christmas, Easter is not as enthusiastically celebrated among the Lutheran Finns. Instead of the true message of Easter, the growing commercialism of the holiday is making Easter more popular. Stores are filled with things that especially appeal to children: Easter bunnies, chicks and chocolate eggs.

On the other hand, Easter is the most important festival of the year for the Orthodox Church, who

Finns do send Easter cards; the custom became popular already in the 1880's. The illustrations range from religious themes to witches.

Easter cuisine often consists of roast lamb for the main course. Often included are the traditional puddings, *mämmi* and *pasha*. Some claim that mämmi looks unappetizing, but is delicious. Pasha is a creamy-colored pudding which sounds more appetizing.

Regardless of how it is celebrated, Easter means a four-day weekend for Finns, when perhaps one can already see some signs of spring.

We have books in our library with information on Finnish holidays, including Easter.

We have been the recipients of a beautiful sevenvolume set of hardback books of Z. Topelius' stories, in Finnish. Since we already have a duplicate of this series on our shelves, we would like to see these books (as a set) find a good home in exchange for a donation to the library. IITTI COAT OF ARMS DONATED



Mark Rikkonen presented the "Coat of Arms of Iitti" (Iitin Vaakuna), his home county in Finland, to the Chairman of the Finnish Center Association, Lois Makee, during the FCA Annual Meeting on Sunday, February 16. The shield was donated by the county of Iitti during his visit there last summer.

Iitti is located in the province of Southern Finland and is part of the Kymenlaakso region. The municipality has a population of 6,959 (January 31, 2014) and covers an area of 265.28 square miles of which 37.56 miles is water. The population density is 11.8 inhabitants per 31 square miles.

In 1990, the center of litti, which surrounds the old parish church, was voted the most attractive kirkonkylä "church village" in Finland.

The municipality is unilingually Finnish.



TEAMWORK

Teamwork is a major aspect of two of this scribes current past-times: singing with the Finnish American singers and making pasties. Each activity is comprised of various components that are comparable, and that illustrate the importance of teamwork.

- The Singers have a leader in the person of our director Hank Naasko who commits to weekly practices and twice yearly concerts. Pasty Bake coordinator Paul Rajala oversees the order process, pre-bake day prep, and smooth flow of task coverage on the day we make, bake, and distribute the pasties...each time we make them.
- We have a second-in-command in FASM, accompanist Bill Gramzow, much like Nancy Rajala is the "commander in charge of packaging" and right-hand-helper to Paul for the Bakes.
- Our chorus is comprised of 4 major voices: soprano, alto, tenor, and baritone/bass, with some further division among the voices based on need, ability, and preference. Tasks are broken down more at the Bake, but are also based on ability, preference, and need. We have peelers and choppers, dough mixers, measurers and flatteners, filling mixers and scoopers, crimpers, oven tenders, finished pasty removers (from baking trays), pan washers and cleaner-uppers, baggers, boxers, cashiers and treat table suppliers.
- Each activity depends on each part of its team the team does not function well if one of the components is missing or not performing optimally with the rest of the group.

The Bible points out that many parts with different functions make up the "whole," and that each one is important and should be considered a gift (talent). "Now as we have many parts in one body, and all the parts do not have the same function" (Roman 12:1), "And there are different activities, but the same God activates each gift in each person." (1 Corinthians 12:6) It's human nature to feel that perhaps *our* contribution is more important than someone else's. Everyone secretly wants to be considered indispensable! Successful teams recognize that although no one is indispensable, each "job" is important and they celebrate the importance of *each* contributing member's valued contribution.

Each of our singers is important to the heart, sound, and spirit of FASM. Health concerns, conflicting schedules, and just *life* take a toll on our small group. We support each other while encouraging new singers to join our group, so if you like to sing, come see what we are all about. This would be a great opportunity for young singers in local colleges, fresh from an intensive high school choir experience to "get their music on" in a well-respected but small musical group.

Our practices are Monday evenings, from 7 pm to 9 pm with coffee and treats after practices, if you'd like to stay. We are currently meeting in the Lounge at the FCA. Please come check us out....and thank you for supporting our other teamwork effort – pasty making!

FINLAND TODAY

First, Valmet and Klabin S.A. of Brazil have signed a contract for Valmet to deliver two pulp drying lines for a new plant that Klabin is building in Parana, Brazil. The value of the deal is worth about \$200 million. The new plant will be ready in 2016 and will produce about 1.7 million tons of pulp per year. Valmet will supply the machinery, engineering, installation, training and the start-up.

Klabin is Brazil's largest producer and exporter of paper, cardboard, corrugated packaging. Klabin, founded in 1899, has 16 plants, 15 in Brazil and one in Argentina.

Valmet also announced that it has signed a contract with Cheng Yang Paper Mills of Viet Nam, to supply a containerboard line for its new plant in Ho Chi Minh City. The new production line will produce high grade container board using 100% recycled raw material.

Earlier this year, Valmet announced that it has received an order from OKI Pulp and Paper of Indonesia to produce a "fine paper line." The project will include: two biomass gasifiers, two biomass boilers, an evaporation system, two lime kilns, and two pulp dryers. The value of the order is about \$375 million.

Valmet is a leading global developer of services and technologies for the pulp paper and energy industries. The technology includes building entire pulp and paper mills; tissue, cardboard and paper production lines, as well as bio-energy power plants.

Valmet, who has been doing business for two hundred years, had sales of \$2.9 billion in 2013.

The VTT Technical Research Center of Finland has developed a camera that is able to detect early stages of skin cancer. The ultra-precision hyperspectral camera can recognize within two seconds the early stages of skin cancer that is invisible to the naked eye. The camera, invented by Heikki Saari of the VTT, has been patented in the United States and in Finland.



You will find that Easter decorations in Finland show lots of colored eggs and yellow flowers (e.g. daffodils). Some Finnish families sow grass in small pots before Easter, and put eggs in them when the grass has grown.

Another Easter tradition in Finland you might see is children walking between houses, handing out twigs or decorations, asking for a few coins in exchange.

Traditional Easter food in Finland can be ham, poultry, or lamb. Note that during the <u>public holidays</u> for Easter in Finland, many businesses remain closed.


