FROM THE FCA LIBRARY



In the U.S. people can name their babies just about anything. Upon hearing a child's name one may wonder whether the child is a boy or a girl. Names may be spelled in a weird way just to be creative, or some be so bad they can be considered child abuse.

In Finland, it's different. Finland is one of about a dozen countries having name laws, that is, laws governing what name can be given a child. First names became mandatory by law in 1921. The name law of 1985 gets very specific about what kinds of first names can be given a child.

The name must be unique to the gender of a child. A girl may not have a boy's name nor may a boy have a girl's name.

The name may not be a surname, except a patronymic as the last given name (no names like our Madison, McKenzie, McKenna, etc.) (By the way "Mc" and "Mac" mean "son of", so they don't seem appropriate for girls, do they?)

The name may not have been used by another sibling. This often happened in olden days. If a child died, another child was often given the name of the deceased. My own grandmother (in this country) had three boys named Heikki (Henry). Only one survived to adulthood. One can imagine the problem this would give genealogists. This practice also seemed to erase the fact that the previous child ever existed. Should he/she not be remembered, even though deceased?

A child's name must have a Finnish spelling unless the parents are of foreign descent. It should be pronounceable by the teacher when the child enrolls in school. It seems this would be somewhat of a problem in Finland now that they have refugees from many foreign countries.

The name may not be a curse word or otherwise derogatory. Fortunately the name law was in effect when one father wanted to name his child Otto Piru Perkele (Otto Devil Satan). Permission was denied.

Animal names are discouraged. One could not name a child Sika (Pig) or Kärppä (Weasel). The name

Sirkka (grasshopper) must have been grandfathered in, for it has been a common name for girls for a long time.

Parents of new-born children must name their child and inform the population registry within two months of the child's birth. If the parents are church members, the name is given at baptism. The minister will judge whether the name is appropriate and allowed. If the parents are not church members the child is registered in the civil records and someone in that organization will rule on the appropriateness of the name.

Every person must have at least one but no more than three first names. A hyphenated name (such as Marja-Leena) counts as one name.

First names are subject to changing fashions. In the early 19th century, almost all Finnish names were taken from the official almanac, published by the Royal Academy of Turku. They consisted of Biblical names, names of saints popular before the Reformation, and names of Swedish royalty. After the publication of the *Kalevala* many parents started choosing names of mythical characters from folklore. Some clergy initially refused to christen babies with such "pagan" names. The first given name of Finnish origin, Aino, was accepted into the almanac in 1890, followed by numerous others in 1908. Now the almanac has been gradually changed to include new, popular names. At present, all names which have at least 1,000 bearers are incorporated into the almanac of the University of Helsinki and given a "name day".

If it happens that a person, or the parents, decide to change the child's name, the first name can be changed once without specific reason. An over 12-year-old child's first name cannot be changed without his/her consent.

Next month we'll look at laws governing Finnish surnames.

FINLAND TODAY



First, "Finland Frets as Russia Launches Military Drills on Its Doorstep". That was a headline on NBC News online that I saw on April 5. "Russian military drills near neighboring Finland have provoked concern that northern Europe may be the next focus of Moscow's seemingly renewed appetite for redrawing its borders". Says Andrew Kutchins, a senior fellow at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, "The people of Helsinki are nervous. What Putin is doing is sending shock waves through Europe." According to Andrei Illarionov, a former close advisor to Putin, in an article in the Swedish newspaper Svenska Dagbladet, "Kremlin would seek 'historical justice' by reclaiming Finland and ex-Soviet countries as part of an enlarged Russian Federation. Parts of Georgia, Ukraine, Belarus, the Baltic states, and Finland are states where Putin claims to have ownership." Illarionov is now a senior fellow at the Cato Institute in Washington. He was the chief economic advisor to Putin until 2005.

"Finland isn't Ukraine", said Oliver Bullough, a commentator and author of 'Last man in Moscow', "Finland may not be a NATO member, but it is in the European Union, and you can bet that if Russia were to start invading members of the E.U., the E.U. would have something to say about it. The Russians have a 'grudging respect' for the Finns because of the way they resisted Moscow's Red Army during World War II. Apart from Britain and the Soviet Union, Finland was the only European nation involved in the war to not to be occupied by a foreign country". Wow, that is some scary stuff...

And in some related, or not related news, Finland's Prime Minister Jyrki Katainen says that he will not seek reelection as the head of the National Coalition party. Which also means that he is not a candidate for the Prime Minister's job. In Finnish politics, the party that has the most seats in the parliament, gets to choose the Prime Minister. According to the latest poll, the Center party is ahead in the Parliamentary elections, and the Social Democrats are second place, and Katainen's National coalition is in third place. Katainen says that he is interested in becoming Finland's next EU Commissioner. Finland's current commissioner Olli Rehn says that he will retire after the May EU elections.

In the annual Social Progress Index, Finland again ranked high. The SPI rates 132 countries on more than 50 indicators, such as access to education and information, health, shelter, personal safety, and tolerance. Ahead of Finland were New Zealand, Switzerland, Iceland and Holland. The Index said that Finland excelled in allowing its citizens to improve the quality of their lives and reach their full potential with access to basic knowledge and personal freedom and choice. Finnish students are the best problem solvers in Europe. According to the latest OECD study, the tests focused on how 15 year olds could use their knowledge in real life scenarios. In general boys were more successful at problem solving than girls, but in Finland the roles were reversed with the girls doing significantly better than the boys. In Finland about 3,700 students from 311 schools took part in the study, while internationally there were 85,000 students from 44 countries.

And finally, Hilma and Elma, a couple of 75+ ladies were walking in the lake front park in Lake Worth, Florida when they happened to walk by a couple of 85+ gentlemen, Heikki and Eino, sitting on a park bench watching the "girls" walk by. As the Ladies walked by, Elma says to Hilma: "Did you hear that, those guys whistled at us?" Hilma says to Elma: "Hold on to your pantyhose girl, those guys weren't whistling, they were wheezing just trying to breathe."
