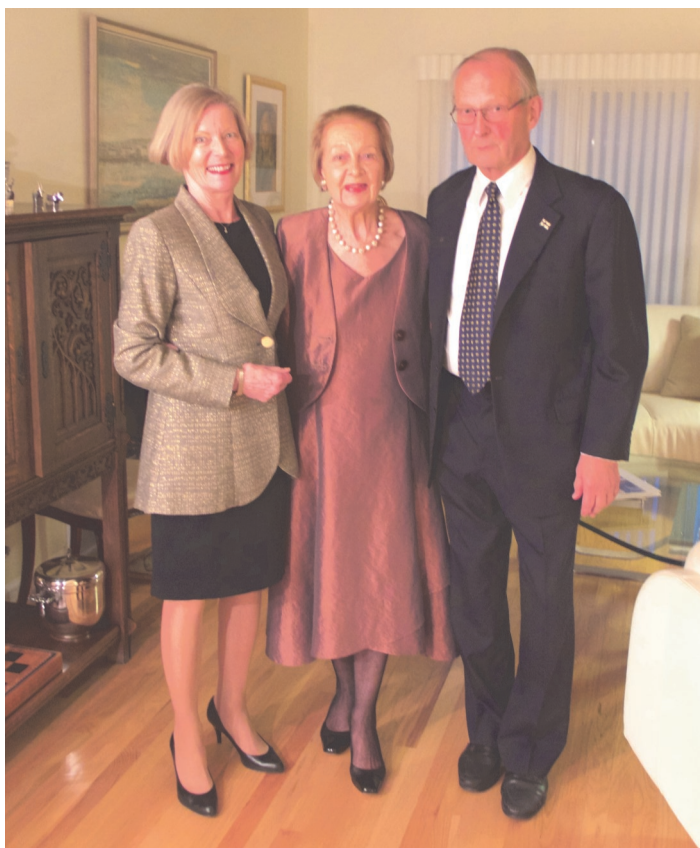
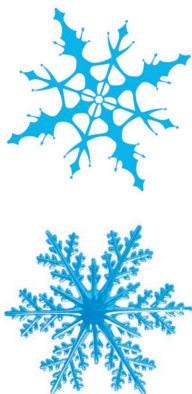

FROM THE LIBRARY



We have recently added the following items to our collection:

YANKEE YOOPER ON THE KEWEENAW by Philip J. Howard, Jr., M.D. In 2005, two weeks after retiring, Dr. Howard got a call asking if he would be willing to go to Hancock, Michigan to work at the Portage Lake Hospital for a while. Although he was born and raised in Lower Michigan, he was not acquainted with the Upper Peninsula. This is his account of that experience. It is interesting, especially for one who knows the U.P., to observe a stranger to the area fall in love with our beloved Yooper country. It's in biography, B Ho.

INSIDER'S GUIDE: VISIT FINLAND. This lovely little picture book of Finland was brought back by FinnFest 2015 attendees. The Finns really know how to show off their country with their photography. It's a thin book and you may have trouble finding it but do try. It's in 948.9 In.

FINLANDIA: THE STORY OF SIBELIUS by Elliot Arnold. This is a timely addition in this year in which we're honoring Sibelius. It was written in 1941, while Sibelius was still alive. It presents him in a historical context and one gets to know Sibelius quite intimately. Very easy reading. B Si.

SCANDINAVIAN PROVERBS collected by Julie Jensen McDonald contains folk wisdom from Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden; they have all been translated into English. One of my favorites is "That which is loved is always beautiful." 398.9 Sc.

SURVIVAL FROM HOPELESSNESS by Evelyn Hartman Park. Dr. Park was born in Hancock but when she was 14 she accompanied her family when they moved back to Finland. She was a medical student when the Winter War broke out. The medical students were assigned work among the civilians. She tells about the horrors she and others experienced in war-torn Finland including the trauma the children experienced as they were torn from their parents and shipped to Sweden. It will send shivers down your spine and bring a tear to your eye. You'll find it in biography, B Pa

THE KANTELETAR, poems collected by Elias Lönnrot, translated by Keith Bosley. On his poem-collecting trips in Karelia, Lönnrot collected many poems besides those he included in **THE KALEVALA**. Many of them are included here. You will find this among the books on the **KALEVALA**. 398.2 Ka.

KAJAANI by Jorma Komulainen. This is a beautiful picture book of the town of Kajaani in Finland, with text in several languages including English. 914.71 Ko

MADE A KILLING IN COPPER by Richard L. Baldwin. This fictional story of murder in Michigan's Keweenaw Peninsula is an interesting entertainment for an evening or two, especially for those to whom all the places mentioned are familiar. Recommended if you like murder mysteries. Baldwin, who lives in Haslett, Michigan, is not a novice writer. This is his 16th murder mystery. F Ba.

THE SAGA OF SANTA CLAUS by Mark D. Couturier. Based in Finland, this is a clever fantasy suggesting the origin of the Santa myth, including how various things came to be, such as his reindeer transportation, coal for bad children, his "Ho, ho, ho" greeting, and so on. Born in South Korea but now residing in Grand Rapids, Michigan, Couturier has developed an interest in Finland and contacted the Finnish Center asking for someone who could help him with his research. The FCA directed him to me. I have worked with him for quite a while. I congratulate Mark on finally getting his book into print after all the work he put into it. Although we have put this into the Juvenile section, you adults are welcome to check it out as well. I enjoyed it. You'll find it in: J F Co.

THE SURVIVORS by Anita Hokkanen Middleton. During the 1930's a "Karelian fever" spread among some North American Finns. About six to seven thousand of them decided to emigrate to Stalin's Russia, looking for a Utopia. They did not find it. Most of them disappeared in Stalin's purges. This video documentary is the story of twenty of the survivors, four of whom returned from Russian labor camps. It's worth watching, "lest we forget". 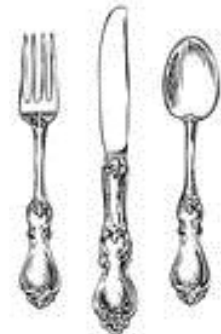

FINLAND TODAY



First, let's start with a philosophical question, what is "the good life?" Is it being happy all of the time? These are the questions that face a Finnish Doctor of medicine, a child psychiatrist, psychotherapist, and a coach to psychotherapists, Antti Mattila. A few stories up from where the doctor has his offices, there is a second small office where the doctor practices his true passion, that of a psychologist. This room is so small that it barely has room for an armchair, a couch and a small table. In this small room, the Doctor discusses with his clients questions that have elsewhere been left unanswered. Questions such as: Is it time to change careers? How does one recover from a divorce? Is it possible to be happy in your day to day life if someone close to you has passed away? And, what exactly is "the good life?" "Everyone should have the right to pursue a good life," says Mattila. "But it is not the same as everyone's right to happiness". "People are having children at an older age, and are accustomed to the single life. They cannot accept that a baby requires attention around the clock. Then they want a divorce when the child is just a couple months old," says Mattila. He wishes that parents would withstand a little longer, and would have the patience to last past the worst chaos. "Continuous happiness is impossible, because the pursuit of a good life may demand pain and patience every now and then." "Happiness is not present in every moment,"----philosopher, Epictetus.

The best porter beer in the world is brewed in Finland? Yes, that's right, according to the Global Association of Craft Beer Brewers (GACBB). The Tampere based brewery, Pynnikki, was awarded the Gold Medal for its Vahvaportteri beer at the Global Craft Beer Awards held in Berlin. Over 60 breweries worldwide took part in the event. In the spring of 2014, the future of the brewery was in doubt, because a fire destroyed much of the equipment, halting production for months. Due to Finnish laws, the brewery can't sell their gold medal winning beer directly to the customers, but rather through the national retailer, Alko. Finnish "gluten free" beer, Kukko (Rooster), is set to be exported to the U.S. in early 2016, after the Finnish brewery, Laitilan Wirvoitusjuomatehdas, signed a contract with Good Life Imports, a company that specializes in bringing European products to the American market.

In Europe, you can call a product as "gluten free" if it's below 20 parts per million, like Kukko is, but in the U.S., the FDA has taken a long time in deciding when you can call a product gluten free. As a result, the Kukko beer will be identified as, "crafted to reduced gluten". Also distinguishing it from other similar products on the market, Kukko, is devoid of the chemicals typically used to reduce the gluten levels during the brewing process. Kukko is made completely from malted barley. Upon entering the U.S. market, "our intention is not to advertise it as a gluten free beer, but as a great tasting beer that happens to be gluten free". 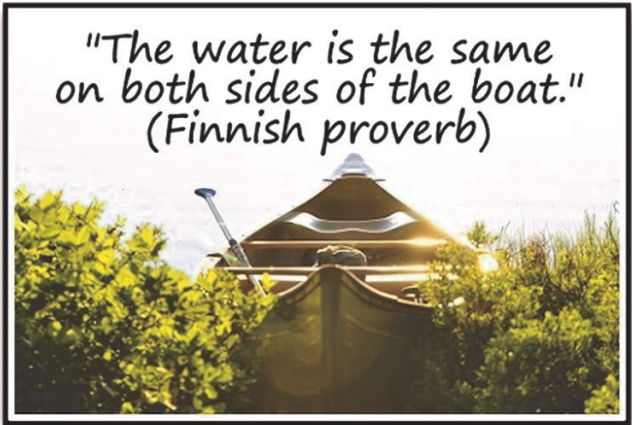
The best gin in the world is distilled in Finland? Apparently so. Napue Gin, created by Kyro Distillery Company in Isokyro, Finland, won first place in the Gin and Tonic category at the International Wine and Spirits Competition held in the UK. Wine estates and distilleries from 90 countries took part, including about 150 varieties of gin. According to the Kyro distillery website, "The gin's key components have their roots in the very heart of Finnish nature, with meadowsweet, sea-buckthorn, cranberries, and birch leaves, giving the scents and flavors of a misty Finnish meadow, early in the morning. Cool as the Finnish night but with the heat of rye and the midnight sun, it is a gin unlike any other." By the way, what is "meadowsweet"?
