FROM THE LIBRARY



FinnFest 2018 is scheduled for June 24-29 in Tampere* Finland. Tampere, the second largest city in Finland, is about 108 miles northwest of Helsinki, on a narrow isthmus between two lakes, Näsijärvi and Pyhäjarvi (järvi = lake.) It is known as Finland's "Manchester", after England's factory town of the same name. But unlike its English namesake, Tampere has no smog, grit or grime. Its many factories have been situated according to a carefully prepared plan so as to avoid spoiling the town's beautiful setting. It is a well laid-out and well built town, embellished with many parks and works of art, museums, art galleries, theaters and statues.

Tampere had its beginnings in three estates established around 1600; at the time the land was inhabited by tenant farmers. The city was established in 1779 by decree of King Gustav III of Sweden. The town made little progress until 1819, when it was visited by Czar Alexander of Russia, when Finland was a Grand Duchy of Russia. He was so impressed by the potential of Tampere that he granted it the privilege of a free city, meaning it could import whatever was needed to develop industry: machinery and raw material for its factories. The first industrial plant, a cotton textiles factory, was established by a Scotsman, James Finlayson in 1820. There are now some 400 industrial establishments of various sizes, which provide employment for roughly 65% of its population. In spite of this, it remains one of the cleanest, brightest cities in Scandinavia.

Tampere prides itself on its theatrical energy and achievements. In addition to the two main theaters (Tampere Worker's Theater and Tampere Theater Company), and the internationally known Tampere Theater Summer Festival, there is the extremely popular Pyynikki Summer Theater with its revolving auditorium, two professional traveling theaters, a theater for children and teenagers, a university student theater, and numerous amateur theater groups.

Nor is music neglected. Its city orchestra and Tampere opera are among the oldest in Finland. There are dozens of choirs; the Händel choir, among others, regularly performs major choral works with the city orchestra. Tampere is also a center of light music, especially pop and rock. Local bands have created their own type of music which has become known as Manse (from Manchester) Rock.

Besides theaters and music events, there are numerous museums, among them the Hiekka Museum (an art collection, including works by Wäinö Aaltonen), a Museum of Art, the Häme Museum (some 25,000 items pertaining to local history and traditions), a Moomin Museum, the Technical Museum (includes automobiles, airplanes, textile technology, and more), and the Lenin Museum (Lenin and Stalin met here for the first time in 1905.) A unique museum is the Haihara Doll Museum, with a collection of 1200 dolls from all over the world, as well as costumes and toys; a visit here is strongly recommended.

Works of architecture are not to be missed. The cathedral, the work of Lars Sonck, 1907, contains valuable paintings by Hugo Simberg, including "The Wounded Angel"; the altar fresco is by Magnus Enckel. Of ultra modern design is the Kaleva church by Reima and Raili Pietilä. Viewed from the top, the outline forms that of a fish (an early Christian symbol). Another unique Pietilä design is the library; viewed from the top it resembles a capercaille, a grouse found in Finland

Of the dozens of eating places, the most unique is the one at the top of the Näsinneula tower, an elegant revolving dining establishment. It is situated in the center of an amusement park containing a children's zoo, an aquarium, and a planetarium as well as the Sara Hilden Art Museum.

You will not be bored in Tampere even if you stray from the FinnFest premises! More information about FinnFest can be found by Googling FinnFest 2018.



Upswing

Director: Johanna Vuoksenmaa, 2003 Finnish with English subtitles

Upswing, a black comedy received seven nominations at the Finnish Oscars, earning Jussi awards (Finland's Academy Awards) for best film, best music, and best script. Donations appreciated.

Reviewers call this film about a "holiday from hell", a "refreshing comedy," "funny and frightening." Upswing is about an upper class, young couple, envious of their friend's exotic holidays, who meet a travel agent offering them the ultimate experience: four weeks in one of Helsinki's shadiest suburbs. They are to live as unemployed, leaving behind credit cards, cash, etc. All of this is a scam; they are totally conned. One reviewer wrote that Upswing would have lost a lot if it had been given "the Hollywood treatment." Because of the humor and the references to places in Helsinki, non-Finnish reviewers have wondered if non-Finns would understand the film, that it seemed more for domestic consumption. That in itself would be interesting, if true. Is Finnish American sense of humor similar to that of Finns? What is our knowledge of Helsinki?

HAPPY BIRTHDAY EDWARD HYYPIO

The boy, Edward Arthur Hyypio has, therefore, celebrated his birth on the 28th of February every year since his birth - for 90 years now.

Edward was born to Axel Peter Hyypio and Ida Maria Heikkinen Hyypio on the homestead of his grandparents, Johan Petter Hyypio and Kristiina Sieppi Hyypio who were the first settlers of Tapiola, Michigan. Happy 90th Birthday Edward.





FINLAND TODAY



First, air, light, nutrients and water are the typical ingredients for growing happy vegetables. Soon living moss could be part of the mix, thanks to a new sustainable and resource saving growing media developed in Finland. A lot of our vegetables today are grown in greenhouses using hydroponic (soil free) farming. This often means using a stone-based material, known as stonewool, as the growing media. While good for growth, stonewool can be water-thirsty and difficult to recycle. Now Finnish substrate manufacturer, Novarbo (part of Biolan Group), has turned to living sphagnum moss to give farmers a more sustainable alternate which it calls, Mosswool. "You can water our Mosswool slabs less because moss retains water very efficiently," explains Petri Konttinen, technology expert at Novarbo. "This saves water and means fewer costs to the farmer. After use, stonewool should be taken to a recycling plant where the stones and organic material are mechanically separated. However. Mosswool can be put directly into the farmer's own compost with other crop residues."

Finnish wave (like waves in oceans) energy technology provider, Wello, has signed a contract with a Chinese conglomerate CIMC OEI to introduce its wave energy converters to the Chinese market. Wello's mission to capture energy from ocean waves began more than 10 years ago and has resulted in the Penguin Wave Energy Converter (WEC). The next phase sees the establishment of a demonstration site in China to confirm the suitability of Wello's technology in the Chinese waters. Here the wave climate is slightly milder compared to the Northern Atlantic waters where WEC was developed.

Freedom of the press has hit its low point since it first was monitored in 2006 with only 30 countries out of 167 were classified as "fully free". Finland was once again in first place, as to having the freest press of any country. Finland was once again classified as a "full democracy" along with only 19 of the 167 countries, that's only 4.5% of the world's population. According to the index, the Nordic countries again led the world as far as democracy was concerned, with Norway leading the way followed by Iceland and Sweden, and Denmark in fifth place and Finland in ninth spot.

According to Health Consumer Powerhouse, a health-oriented think tank based in Sweden, Finland retained its sixth place in the latest version of the Euro Health Consumer Index. Finland excelled particularly in delivering top outcomes at a relatively low cost, ranking first in terms of value-for-money healthcare. Leading the index was Netherlands, followed by Switzerland, Denmark in third place, and tied for fourth place was Norway and Luxembourg, followed by Finland in sixth place.

Helsinki-based Granlund Consulting has extended its portfolio offering and expanded to the UK by acquiring Greenfield Consulting and a majority share in Greenfield Nordic. The acquisition offers Granlund Consulting entry into the UK market, as Greenfield provides consulting services for energy production, energy networks, and energy production technologies in the UK and Finland. "In the future, we can offer our clients more extensive knowledge for regional energy projects," says Ville Reinikainen, director, Energy, Granlund Consulting. "Greenfield supports our internationalisation efforts in Europe," says Miia Anttila, CEO of Granlund Consulting. "Right from the start of the negotiations it has been apparent that there is a clear synergy in our co-operation. We are two very similar actors and eagerly start 2018 together."




