

FROM THE LIBRARY



During the Middle Ages, when Finland was under Swedish rule, Finnish was only an oral language. Middle Low German was used for business, administration affairs were conducted in Swedish, and religious activities were conducted in Latin, for Finland was still Catholic. The common people spoke Finnish, which the Swedes considered an inferior language. In practice Finns lacked societal rights because they could not communicate in the official language of the country. It took years before the situation was remedied. The first written form of Finnish was created by Mikael Agricola, a Finnish bishop in the 16th century. He was a learned theologian and linguist. Besides being fluent in Finnish and Swedish, he knew Latin, German, Greek and Hebrew.

Mikael Olavinpoika (Mikael, son of Olaf) was born into a wealthy peasant family in Nyland in the village of Torsby in Pernäjä around 1510. Mikael was a bright boy; he was home-schooled by the vicar of the town. At age ten he was sent to Viipuri (Vyborg) to continue his studies. Here he assumed the surname "Agricola" based on his father's status ("farmer"; "agriculture"). When the principal of the school, Johannes Erasmuksenpoika, moved to Turku to work for the bishop, he took Agricola, then age 18, with him. There Agricola became a scribe to the bishop, and a year later a chancellor. A couple of years later he was ordained a priest. In 1536 he was sent to study at the University of Wittenberg, where the Reformation had begun. He studied under Martin Luther who still worked there as a professor. He returned to Turku in 1539 after receiving his Master's degree.

In Turku Agricola became the headmaster of the most important school in Finland, the Turku Cathedral School. He did not like his job, calling the students "untamed animals". He quit the job in 1548. In 1554 he was consecrated as the bishop of Turku and began a reform of the Finnish church along Lutheran lines.

One of the principles of the Reformation was that everyone would be able to read and hear the Word of God in their own native language. Since Finnish had not developed as a written language, when Agricola endeavored to translate religious books into Finnish he had to develop an entire alphabet, spelling and quite a bit of vocabulary. Liturgical texts had to be created in Finnish for use by the clergy. The Bible had to be translated and the people gradually taught to read it.

During his time as headmaster, Agricola found time to translate and start publishing. His first work (1543) was *Abckirja* (ABC book), a primer for reading and a catechism. The first printing contained 16 pages. A second printing was released in 1551 with 24 pages. This was followed in 1544 by *Rucouskirja Bibliasta* (A Prayer Book from ye Bible). This book's 900 pages included 643 prayers and, among other things, 29 hymns.

By far Agricola's most important work was his translation of the New Testament (1548). It contains 718 pages and many illustrations. He translated at least seven other religious books. He intended to translate the entire Bible into Finnish, but due to lack of funds this was not possible.

In addition to their spiritual and administrative duties within the church, bishops also had secular responsibilities. They were involved in civic affairs and were speakers and negotiators. In 1554-1557 a war was fought with Russia over the control of an area on the border. The Swedish king sent a delegation of a hundred men, including Agricola, to negotiate the terms of peace. On the return trip Agricola became ill and died on April 9, 1557 in the village of Kyrönniemi. He was buried in Viipuri, most likely in the cathedral. The exact site of his grave has not been located. April 9 is also Elias Lönrot's birthday and it is celebrated in Finland as the day of the Finnish language.

The Mikael Agricola Church in Helsinki is named after Agricola. In 2007, 450 years after his death, Agricola was selected as the main motif for a commemorative coin, the Mikael Agricola Finnish language commemora-


tive coin. This coin was issued to honor Agricola's life work as a contributor to the Protestant Reformation in Finland and as the father of the Finnish written language.



FINNISH FILM

Tuntematon sotilas (Unknown Soldier)


Director: Aku Louhimies

March 17, Sunday, 2:00 pm Admission free; donations appreciated.

This is a new film based on the spectacular book (*Tuntematon sotilas*, The Unknown Soldier, 1954) by Vãniö Linna; a masterful story about a battalion in the Continuation War between Finland and the Soviet Union. Although this film won 4 Jussi awards and best actor, critics are deeply divided about the film.

According to some critics, Louhimies manages to emulate the realism of war with beautiful cinematography and special effects, but fails to capture Linna's characterization of the war, and makes "the battalion look like poster boys from a teen girl's wall" and creates characters as hollow as a "Suomi machine gun shell on the Russian border." Other critics, however, say the film is "gritty, forlorn, honest, and realistic, as well as a pacifist piece confronting less pleasant sides of Finnish history.

Linna's story should be required reading for every Finnish American. No film, including this one, can capture the genius of Linna's story. Because of the film's popularity in Finland, we offer it and look forward to discussion afterward.




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MARCH IN THE GARDENS

FINLAND TODAY

And first, why is the Finnish Forest Industries doing so well, even though people are using less paper and more emails and there is less of a demand for paper in offices? So where is the demand coming from? The good news is *less plastic* will be used for packaging and that will be replaced by biodegradable pulp base packaging and cardboard. As consumers are looking for biodegradable products made of fiber based materials, such as biodegradable pulp based shoes, pulp based textiles and pulp based hygiene products will become available. The biodegradable pulp is the future of Finnish forest Industries.

"VTT – had developed a device for processing problematic waste". The Technical Research Centre (VTT, also a partner in a California nonprofit -THINK BEYOND PLASTIC) has been funded by "Business Finland', a new process (to be commercialized in the future) a device that could revolutionize waste management. VTT's scientist has develop a "cylindrical extruder" (modular mixer) that can recycle mixed textiles and plastics, plastics film and food waste into pellets. The Extruder is capable of melting, mixing and extruding materials. This would bring down the cost of recycling and stop the need to separate plastic, fibers and food. This innovation is believed to enhance sustainable economies.

Finland Consular services is in high demand because Finns are planning to travel more in 2019, creating the need to process visas and passports. In 2018 approximately 241,000 Finns had registered and had submitted their travel plans details to the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. The Ministry will give instructions, advice and help, to Finnish citizens in Foreign Countries. The Ministry has a website that has a lot of information such as: travel advice, security issues and bulletins from 150 foreign countries.

Yle, reported that a Finnish stamp named "Calm and Tranquil" had won first prize in the "Best Stamps Award" in Spain. Stiina Hovi designed the stamp that represented a summer scene in Turku archipelago. The same stamp had won the most beautiful stamp chosen by the Finns in 2017.

The Scottish music industry event "Showcase Scotland" has chosen Finland to partner in the upcoming festival in 2020. It is organized in Glasgow Scotland and it is a Folk, Celtic music festival. This event will bring 2000 + musicians for an 18-day festival with some 300 concerts. Because of Finland's vibrant folk music traditions and rich diverse music history this is a great partnership.

Ville Virtanen known as "Darude", is one of the most successful Finnish artists of our times. He started his music career in 1995 and released his first hit "Sandstorm" in 1999. Darude has been asked to represent Finland at the 2019 Eurovision song Contest in May. Darude said that he is honored and could not turn down the challenge. Darude is planning on releasing three new songs in February.

And Finally,

Recreating their spirited and fun language learning approaches, Salolampi instructors will use Finn Camp's rustic setting as the backdrop for the one all-day Adult camp on Thursday, September 19 and the one all-day Children's camp on Saturday, September 21. A shorter two-hour family fun opportunity will occur on Sunday, September 22.


