KAIKU PERFORMING IN DETROIT AREA

Kaiku, the 2006 Finlandia Foundation Performer of the Year, will be appearing at the Detroit Institute of Arts on Friday, June 2nd at 6:30 and 8:00 p.m. and at the *Detroit* Finnish Cooperative Summer Camp Association (DFCSCA)(aka the Finn Camp), in Wixom on Saturday, June 3rd at 7:00 p.m. Kaiku is a unique fusion of elements. Led by the voices of Jaana Kantola and Paula Jaakola, Kaiku's music draws from stories contained in the Finnish epics, but the beautiful vocals and modern sound reflects the trends that are taking place in Finland and in Europe as a whole today. Kaiku crosses cultures and generations and embodies the fun and beauty of being Finn.

FINLAND TODAY

First, Finland has ordered 5.2 million vaccines against the bird flu for the entire Finnish population. The Dutch company, Solvay Pharmaceuticals, will produce the vaccine against the H5N1 bird flu strain for about \$25 million. The vaccine will be developed in Finland and Solvay will start production in the autumn. The vaccines will be administered to the Finnish population if the current bird flu mutated where it will be passed from human to human. Solvay is also the company that Finland has previously signed an agreement to produce 5.5 million vaccines once the exact composition of the potential mutated virus is known.

The Automation Laboratory of the Helsinki University of Technology has developed a "paper battery". They have produced a battery with a printable layer structure which uses paper containing the electrolyte as the separater between the anode and cathode. This new flexable "SoftBattery" is intended as a power source in disposable microelectronic equipment such as sensors, smart cards, LED's on paper, greeting cards, and electronic paper. The SoftBattery will provide 1.5 volts and 2 milliwatts of power. The battery will be produced by Automation Laboratory's spin-off company, Enfucell Ltd.

New Russian customs regulations may significantly affect trade between Finland and Russia. Also the tourist trade may be reduced by up to 40%. Russia has passed legislation that limits the amount of goods Russian visitors may back. The previous 50 kilos of goods has been reduced to 30 kilos. The number of duty free shopping trips has also been reduced to one a month.Last year Russian visitors spent about \$485 million in Finland, but this may now be reduced by as much as 40%.

Finland's Neste Oil Corporation and Austrian oil and gas group, OMV, are jointly planning to build a large scale plant to produce next-generation biodiesel fuel. The facility will be located at OMV's Schwechat refinery site in Austria. The plant production will based on Neste Oil's proprietary NExBTL (Next Generation Biomass to Liquid) technology. The facility will be capable of producing high quality diesel fuel from a variety of renewable raw materials such as vegetable oil and animal fat.

Neste's NExBTL technology will make biodiesel with superior fuel properties and which outperforms conventional biodiesel and diesel grades currently on the market, according to tests by leading heavy duty engine manufacturers.

Neste is also launching its new biogasoline, Futura 98, this spring in the southern part of Finland. The new biogasoline can be used in all gasoline engines. And with the addition of the bio component, emissions of carbon dioxide will be lower.
