Michigan's Columbus

The Life of Douglass Houghton by Steve Lehto

He was born in Troy, New York on September 21, 1809. His father was a justice of the peace and a judge. Douglass was 5 feet 5 inches tall. He had recovered from a hip disease early in childhood. He had no limp, just an inclination to favor his left side.

He had episodes with his experiments with black powder which blew up and burned his face, knocked him down and blinded him temporarily. He recovered completely but the scars on his face remained. Another mishap developed from the gas he discovered and used for demonstrating to his playmates.

His knowledge and education began with his childhood curiosity which was encouraged by his parents.

Successes began to pile up for him at an early age. Promotions were always expected and some positions were created just for him (like lecturer for the City of Detroit).

When you decide to explore Michigan you will start from the Ohio border, continue the freeway through our great state, across the Mackinaw Bridge and turn left to the western end of the Upper Peninsula. If you are a stranger you will wonder why so many sites have the word Houghton on them when you are of course going there.

If you have read *Michigan Columbus* you will have many places to find. Even if you are a resident you may not know enough about Douglass Houghton. He is responsible for launching much of the progress which has developed during his short lifetime and afterwards. This book is a marvelous account of those years, how Michigan and Ohio had many disputes over borders. What a gift to us and our state to have all these happenings put down so clearly.

Douglass Houghton's education, and many talents, are quietly displayed. His easy temperament along with extensive knowledge impressed the most influential citizens in Detroit and Lansing and other towns where the direction of progress was coming from. You must read this book! It will reinforce all of us in understanding the successes have far out-weighed the failures we as a people have endured.

I feel proud to have been born in Houghton. As a small child I helped my dad deliver milk there. It was a place to shop only on rainy and off school days. This book has been a reminder of some of the good years (1930's) even when the depression seemed to affect everyone else.

October 13, 1845

It was a perfect day with sunshine and a light breeze. Houghton had a full day ahead. He needed to make a trip to Eagle River to provide supplies for Samuel Hill, his surveyor and his crew who had been with him since early 1845. He was invited to stay the night but Houghton refused – he had to get some mail off from Eagle River and had a deadline to meet. The next mail would have made him late.

They started out in the late afternoon when everything was okay except they were rowing against the wind. A half hour after dark a storm came up and snow began to gather. Houghton was guiding the boat and kept his men rowing harder and harder. His dog Meeme was part of the group. They struggled through heavy winds and high waves which forced them to stay close to the shore. When they were forced out into open water, the boat capsized. When they found themselves in the water they tried to hang on to the upturned boat.

Houghton's last request, "Never mind me, go ashore if you can. Be sure I'll get ashore without aid!"

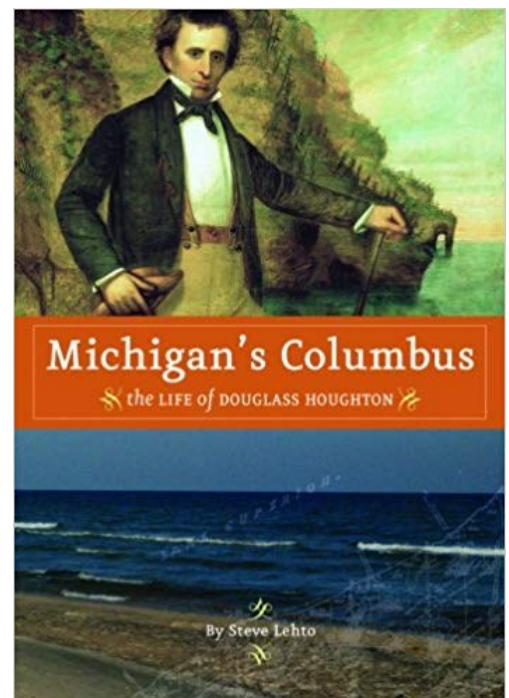

Most of the essential work Douglass Houghton had planned and done was continued by his colleagues. His brother was caring for his affairs after a long time of searching for his body and grieving with the whole state of Michigan. His importance was enhanced because of the need to replace his variety of projects. His colleagues stepped up to the plate to continue the development of Michigan.

Sam Hill followed Jacob Houghton as Superintendent of the Quincy Mine until 1860. He surveyed the city of Hancock, Isle Royale and provided support to construct the Portage Canal. His name was brought to us when we didn't know what it represented. My Uncle John married Saime (Sim) Lundy from Houghton. She had an odd way of avoiding swear words. She would get frustrated and say "Where in the Sam Hill is my purse?" "Where in Sam Hill have you been?" "What in the Sam Hill is that?" Sim was a gentle, kind and accommodating helper for my grandmother.

You will find this book in the library and the gift shop.

"Let's Talk" will be taking place at 11am. This is a great time to learn about Finnish Heritage.

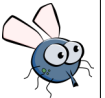

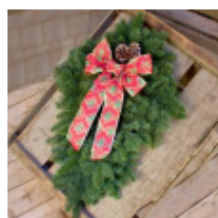

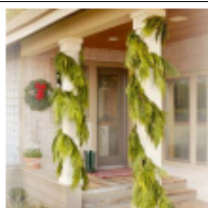

FINLAND TODAY



September is here and the end of summer but let's think, what we as Finns love the most about summer.

- Finns love Summer, and Juhannus is the start of summer for sure, because it is the longest day, and you can stay outside and relax at the cottage all night long without any lights.
- Finns love their sausages and their new potatoes, and new potatoes are the actual start of the summer feasting. So what do you do? Boil in salt and dill and serve with lots of butter.
- Just about every Finn will have a smoker, and you will find smoked pike or smoked perch for dinner – the catch of the day.
- Did you know that Finns eat more fresh vegetables in the 3 summer months than they do all of the rest of the year?
- Do you know about the wild herbs that grow there and the berries and mushrooms – *anyone can pick*. Whatever nature can offer – they will use and eat. Have you ever had stinging nettle soup or nettle pancakes, which are vitamin rich?
- Finns love lifelong learning, there are 181 adult education centers in Finland, and open to everyone. So what can you learn: languages, IT, arts, crafts, music, sports, cooking and wellbeing, and the cost is very reasonable.

During the last 2 years of Finland's Arctic Council Term, Finland has made sure the world knows about four urgent areas: Environmental protection, connectivity, meteorological cooperation and education. Finland had its meeting with the all eight Arctic countries: Finland, Canada, Denmark, Iceland, Norway, Russia, Sweden and the US, in Rovaniemi. The foreign ministers of all eight Arctic countries came to the meeting. At the meeting James Stotts, Inuit Circumpolar Council President stated: *"We have it all: melting sea ice, thawing permafrost, stronger and more frequent storms causing erosion of our coastline...The Arctic climate has changed and the Arctic ecosystem is transforming before our very eyes."* As Iceland takes on the chair of the Arctic Council for the next two-year term, the future goal will be on Arctic marine environment, including plastic waste.
