GARDEN CLUB

News from the Finlandia Gardens

Winter has been a productive time for the garden Club. We have reorganized the wood shop, including the machines, hardware, and tools. We are learning the use of some machines and have established rules for the use of the wood shop.

Everyone must sign a waiver to protect the FCA. Additional projects include tool sharpening, garden bench restoration, and planning for our next garden season.

New projects for 2011 include completing the greenhouse, adding additional rain barrels, creating a new fountain garden, adding a garden at the the new evergreens, and moving shrubs and plants that have outgrown their current location. We hope to add an electrical line to the pergola later in the spring.

Our first wedding in the gardens occurred in late October and we anticipate many more in the future.

We have received a new gasoline blower from the Weingartz Company and we urge your support of this generous local business.

Your contributions to the garden fund have made our continued progress possible and we thank you for your support.

FINLAND TODAY

First, Finland's Raisio Group has acquired the British Big Bear Group. Big Bear produces cereals, mainly for children, but also health cereals, and health snack bars, and Fox brand confectionery.

According to Raisio's CEO Matti Rihko, "With the acquisition of Big Bear Group: Raisio will strengthen its footprint in the markets of Great Britain and Western Europe." Earlier Raisio had acquired Glisten snack bar foods in Britain. What is Raisio? First, Raisio is a small city of 24,400 in the South Western part of Finland near Turku. The company of Raisio, just like Nokia was named after the town where it is located. Raisio the company is the largest producer of grain products in Finland. Raisio's best known international brand is Benecol, the spread you can find in the butter/margarine section in grocery stores. Benecol has plant stanol esters that have proven to reduce cholestrol.

Other Raisio brands are Provena (breakfast cereal products, fruit muesli, oat meal, oat flakes, oat bran, oat flour); Dormen's Nuts (cashews, almonds, macadania, peanuts, and pistachios), and rice crackers, and their motto is "Absurdly delicious nuts and snacks"; Elovena (energy bars, snack biscuits, oat meals), and their motto is "Products that combine healthiness and good taste"; Carlshamn (bakery goods, and dairy products such as vogurts, smoothies, and fruit soups); Sunnuntai (bakery products, flour, mixes, packaged baked goods); Nordic breakfast cereals which contain no artificial preservatives, flavors or colors (real popular in Russia); and Torino pasta products. Raisio also produces animal feeds, 40% of which are exported. Raisio Bio Oils are lubricants based on domestic vegetable oils which are biodegradeable and non toxic. One of Raisio's biggest exports is malt, which is used by breweries and whiskey makers in the Nordic countries, Scotland, and Asian markets, 70% of Raisio's malt products are exported.

Did you know that Finland with a population of 5.35 million, has about 8.1 million mobile phone subscribers?

The top countries in the world for spending money for Research and Development as a percent of GDP (gross domestic product) are Israel, Sweden, Finland, Japan, South Korea, Switzerland, Iceland, and the U.S.

Finland's recovery from the recession is continueing nicely. Last year the GDP increased by 7.5%.

The Finnish insurance company, Sampo, will increase its share of the Nordic countries' largest Bank, Nordea, to 21%. Sampo is buying 10% of the shares that the Swedish government owns of Nordea. It also has been proposed that Sampo's chairman, Bjorn Wahlross, become the new Chairman of Nordea.

Mika Koivuniemi has won the PBA Tournament of Champions in Los Vegas. Koivuniemi, who lives in Hartland, MI beat Tom Smallwood of Saginaw in the final game, 269-207. In the second round of the tournament, Mika was one pin away from a perfect game, winning 299-100 in the most lopsided PBA game ever televised. Koivuniemi, a native of Finland is the first foreign bowler to ever win the U.S. Open and the Masters, and now adds the PBA Tournament of Champions to his list of major wins.

Kiira Korpi of Finland won the bronze medal at the European Figure Skating Championships held in Bern, Switzerland. Korpi was in first place after the short program, but fell doing the triple loop during the free skate (long program). The event was won by Sarah Meier of Switzerland, who was in third place after the short program.

And finally, it was Hilma's day off from working as a waitress at the Finlandia Steak and Grub, when she received an unexpected call from Matti, the owner of Finlandia.

Matti: Say Hilma, could you come in today? Also could you wear that sexy outfit you have? And fix your hair real lovely, and wear your make--up real nice? And walk with the sexy walk that you do?

The Parliament was not new to her when she became president -- she had already served in Parliament for 21 years. She constantly gets letters from little girls who aspire to be president; little boys have also written asking "Can a boy become president also?"

The army had no problem with a woman as Commander-in-Chief as there had already been a woman Minister of Defense -- Elizabeth Rehn.

She does not favor Finland's membership in NATO. She says that if Finland should be attacked, they could take care of themselves as they did in the Winter and Continuation wars, and Finland would not commit to the defense of any other European country, for none came to their defense. Finland does, however, belong to the UN and has sent troops to fight with UN troops.

When she was asked whether she would run for a second term her answer was "I will run because I don't want anyone to think that I quit because the job was too difficult."

Besides poliics, Halonen is interested in the arts, sports and the theater. She paints and draws, is an avid Nordic walker, a swimmer, and participates in women's exercise groups. She says her favorite attire is an athletic outfit and a baseball cap.

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

In the last newsletter, I promised to give you a summary of our book Tarja Halonen: Yksi Meistä (Tarja Halonen: One of Us), by Hannu Lehtilä, c 2005, for the benefit of those who do not read Finnish.

Tarja Halonen was born on Christmas Eve, 1943 in the Kallio district of Helsinki (the working class district, the northeastern part of Helsinki). Her father, Vieno Olavi Halonen, had fought in the Winter War in the front lines. When Tarja was 2-years-old, he left to buy a newspaper and never returned. Later it was determined that he suffered from what we probably now would called PTSD. He just couldn't handle civilian and family life. Her mother initiated a divorce in 1948.

In 1950 her mother married a man named Thure Herman Forss. Tarja regarded him as her dad and holds him in very high regard. Her mother had suffered poverty and wanted her own child to be well-cared-for. But Tarja also suffered from the post-wartime scarceness the rest of the country was going through.

Her mother was very strict, and impressed upon her daughter that she had to do well in school, and behave properly. She was tall for her age and able to hold her own with the neighborhood kids both physically and with her clever, sharp tongue. Paul Anka came to Linnanmäki amusement park in 1959 and she joined the screaming girls, to her mother's horror. She wanted to keep up with the current styles so she bought a pair of used blue jeans. Her mother gave them to a clothing drive for charity.

Tarja was a good student and well-liked and remembered by her teachers although the school was crowded with over 40 students per class. She was the first member in her family line to get a "white cap" (to graduate) --- in 1952. After that she got a law degree from the University of Helsinki. Besides that, she now has 16 honorary degrees, from foreign countries as well as her own country. She speaks Finnish, English and Swedish, and is studying Estonian.

Halonen was Social Affairs Secretary and General Secretary of the National Union of Finnish Students in 1969-70.

Her first position as an attorney was with the central organization of Finnish trade unions 1970-74 and 1975-79. Then she was parliamentary secretary to Prime Minister Kalevi Sorsa 1974-75. This inspired her to run for Parliament. She served six terms in Parliament 1979-2000. She belongs to the Social Democratic Party.

While in Parliament she was also Minister of Social Affairs and Health 1987-90, Minister for the Nordic Corporation 1989-91, Minister of Justice 1990-91 and Minister for Foreign Affairs 1995-2000. It appears that the last especially

was a very important and influential position. It took her all over Europe. She left this to run for president, becoming president in 2000.

Back to her personal life. In 1977 Karl Pekkanen moved in with her and they established an "avoliitto" ("open marriage"). They had a daughter Anna in 1978. Then Tarja suffered the same fate as her mother: Karl left her for another woman. When Tarja became a member of Parliament she took the child with her, breastfed her in a small private room. And so she took care of both her job and her child.

While she was chairman of the Parliamentary Social Affairs Committee she got to know Pentti Arajävi, the secretary of the committee. He was the total opposite of Karl Pekkanen, an ambitious intellectual. In 1985 they became an "avopuoliso"; however they didn't exactly move in together. Tarja had bought a larger apartment and soon Arajarvi bought an apartement next door. Each apartment had a different name on the door but they were joined on the inside. He was known as her "neighbor man". When she became president, this title was not suitable and since the Finnish term "avopuoliso" is not known in other countries they solved the problem by getting married in August 2000. Her and his children from previous relationships were the witnesses. This was Tarja's first marriage, Arajarvi's third; their relationship had already lasted 15 years by that time.

Halonen admits that until she ran for president she had "just been at the right place at the right time" but now she had to take things into her own hands; however, all she spent of her own money on her campaign was 5,000 marks -- they went for two newspaper advertisements. She was busy in her position as foreign minister so she didn't have much time for campaigning.

In the first round of the presidental election her opponents were Elizabeth Rehn, Esko Aho and Riitta Uosikainen and a few other candidates of minor parties. None got a majority, so a run-off was held between Halonen and Esko Aho. She narrowly won the second round; this was quite a surprise, as it was said of her that "she has a slight speech defect, a long nose and carrot-colored hair. Also, she does not belong to the church, she had a child out of wedlock, and is not married to her partner." But soon her approval rating rose to 88% and has remained very high. The Finns take their presidential elections very seriously. The voter turnout for round 2 was 80.2 %. Finns have a high regard for their presidents as well.

President Halonen is a very independent person, thinks for herself.
