Its capacity is 200 people, so sign up early! This exhibit is being shown at various sites all around the world, having started in Helsinki. At 8:00 pm, Susan Saarinen and Mark Coir, Finlandia Foundation Lecturers of the Year, will speak. Susan, Eero's daughter, can provide family information, and Mark is an excellent scholar who has spoken previously at the FCA and will further discuss Eero Saarinen's life and work. Cost for the exhibit and lecture is \$12.

FINLAND TODAY

First, on January 1st, Finland's Foreign Minister, Ilkka Kanerva took over the Chairmanship of the Organization On Security And Cooperation In Europe (OSCE). Kanerva will retain the chairmanship for one year.

The 56 member states of the OSCE include the European countries, central Asian nations, the U.S., Canada, and the countries of south Caucasus.

The number of people earning PhD degrees in Finland has tripled in the last 15 years. And the proportion of women earning PhDs has gone from 1/3 to almost 1/2. Last year, 1,515 students received PhD degrees. And about 80% of the doctoral theses were written in English.

It is estimated that over 100,000 Russian tourists visited Finland during the two weeks surrounding Christmas and New Years. Russians make up the largest group of tourists to visit Finland during this time of the year. And on the average, they also spend the most money, especially on designer products.

According to the online Travel Blackboard magazine, Aeroflot-Russian Airlines has awarded its maintenance service contract for its fleet of Boeing MD-11 cargo planes to Finnair. The contract runs to 2016.

Finnish domestic cinema started the new year with a bang. Year 2008 started with the top three movies being domestically made. Number one was a romantic comedy, Sooloilua (Play Solo); number two was a animated children's comedy, Rollin Sydan (Rolli's Heart); and the third movie was a big budget Christmas movie, Joulutarina (Christmas Story). Christmas Story was also the most popular domestic movie of 2007. Christmas Story will be distributed internationally next year during the holidays. The overall most popular movie in Finland last year was the Simpsons movie.

According to the online National Geographic News, ice skates were invented in Finland. Scientists have concluded that skates made from bone were first used in southern Finland. They were used for transportation in crossing frozen lakes.

The early skates were probably made from horse bones, but other bones were also used, depending on availabil-

ity. Holes were made near the ends of the bones, with leather straps through the holes, which were then tied around the feet.

Former NBA (Chicago Bulls) great, Scottie Pippen, came out of a three year basketball retirement to play a couple of games in Finland. During the first weekend of 2008, Pippen played for the Torpan Pojat. Torpan Poojat (22-1) are in first place in the Finnish Basketball League. In the first game he scored 12 points and in the second, 9 points.

Janne Ahonen, 30, became the first ski jumper in history to win the prestigious Four Hills Tournament in Bischofshofen, Austria for the fifth time. He also won the Four Hills in 1999, 2003, 2005, 2007, and now 2008.

Charlotte Kalla of Sweden won the grueling Tour de Ski in Italy. She overtook Finland's Virpi Kuitunen on the last hill. Kuitunen won the event last year.

The Tour de Ski is a series of 8 cross country ski races held during a 10 day period.

In the Big Air Snowboarding World Cup overall standings, the leader is still Finland's Janne Korpi, with Austria's Stefan Gimpl second and Mathieu Bozzetto of France third.

And finally, an elderly couple, Hilma and Heikki, are on a road trip. It was about noon, so they decide to stop for lunch at roadside restaurant. After finishing their meal, they left the restaurant and resume their trip. After about a half hour of driving, Hilma realized that she had left her glasses at the restaurant. There is a special announcement, Finlandia Foundation is coming to our area. This will be a special time for all our members to hear, see and visit with other Finns from around the country. This will be a fun time so please come and join in.

What is coming in and what is going out?

In last month's article, I mentioned that the cost of the major items at the Finnish Center keeps rising. As we approach this new year and a new budget for the Finnish Center, we understand it will be necessary to work on every side of the expense category while trying to improve our income. The value of our hall rentals has increased 18% over the previous year. New and repeat rentals are coming in to use our facility for business meetings and this is good. These bookings help to fill in the midweek days in the calendar.

Major items such as real estate taxes at \$25 K, Personal Property tax of \$1.6K, heating, lighting, and all the basics for a building like this, comes to \$120K just for starters. Then as time goes along, we may have some other roofing issues that we will have to deal with. Our winters make January a good month to expect a few surprises from our local weatherman. January is known in the business world as the thirteenth work month of the year. It is the month when all the extra work has to be done to figure out the tax forms and other reporting forms that must be done and then, of course, pay them.

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

ISOISÄÄ ETSIMÄSSÄ by Arto Paasilinna. It's a pity that all of you cannot read Finnish, because this tale of a young man ordered to search for his grandfather, Verner Väisänen, who is in the habit of taking off on long trips to parts unknown to escape from his shrewish wife, Letitia, is a delightful read. The grandson Aukusti, under protest, but more afraid of his grandmother than the strange world "out there", proceeds on his search. His travels take him to various places in Finland, Norway, Denmark and finally England. En route he does find his grandfather who convinces him to join him in his travels and escapades. Grandfather seems to have unlimited funds for he is a leathergoods factory owner. Aukusti's world broadens and he finally begins to understand his grandfather. A surprise ending brings the book to a conclusion. This is in fiction of course. F Pa.

FINNISH AMERICAN HORIZONS. HORIZONS PROJECT OF THE FINNISH-AMERICAN BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE U.S.A. 1976. Although the bicentennial is long since past, the articles in this collection are as current as ever. John Ketonen volunteered to serve as chairman of a committee to gather a collection of Finnish-American essays and poems. This 500-page hardback is the result of that effort. Many immigrants tell their stories, some in prose, others in poetry. Submissions are both in English and Finnish. If you aren't up to reading an entire book, this one is for you since each item is an individual entity. You may be surprised at what you find here. I was! A Nisula native submitted a story of the beginnings of his and my hometown. Dick Nivala writes about Buffalo Bill (William Cody) whose name formerly was Koti, a shortened form of Kotilainen, and whose grandfather by that name lived in Liminga in Finland. The book is in non-fiction, 920 Fi.

LUFTWAFFE AT WAR: LUFTWAFFE OVER FINLAND by Kari Stenman and Kalevi Keskinen. After the Winter War, Finland was nearly totally politically isolated. Germany had occupied Denmark and Norway, and Sweden could not be

counted on for help. Finland realized that it could never be strong enough to stand alone if attacked again and the only foreign power in a position to help, if it were needed, was Germany -- if it were willing. When the Continuation War began, German forces, including the air force (Luftwaffe), poured into Finnish Lapland, for Germany, of course, was also at war with the U.S.S.R. Hence the presence of the Luftwaffe in Finland.

This book is not only a brief history of the events of that time but also gives short biographies of the fighter aces. Otherwise the book consists of very little text, except for the captions under the illustrations which comprise most of the book. This should be interesting, especially for men. It can be found in non-fiction 940.54 St.

FINNISH ACES OF WORLD WAR 2 by Kari Stenman and Kalevi Keskinen. According to Soviet sources, the Russians deployed 3253 aircraft against Finland, whereas the Finns had a few very old aircraft plus some new ones they had acquired from the Dutch company Fokker. Can you see David versus Goliath here? Or a mosquito versus an eagle? Nevertheless, the Finns put up a good fight of which they need not be ashamed at all.

This book contains brief summaries of phases of the war(s), numerous illustrations and short biographies of Finnish flying aces. This is a phase of the Winter and Continuation Wars one doesn't often hear or read about, but worth learning about. The book is in non-fiction. 940.54 St.
