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FCA SCHOLARSHIP INTERVIEW

By the time of publication of this issue of the Newsletter, the Scholarship Committee will already have had our reception in honor of the five 2008-09 scholarship recipients. We would like to thank all the donors who have made it possible for the FCA to support the education of our next generation. Tuition and expenses have increased to such a high level that our students will continue to need our financial support, so please consider donating to the Scholarship Committee.

Our fourth and final interview of the 2007-08 FCA scholarship recipients is of Michael Lee Pietila, Jr. Michael is the son of FCA member Lynn Pietila, and the late Mike Pietila. He is completing his freshman year at Concordia University in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and plans to graduate in 2011.

Q: What is your major, and what are your career plans?

A: My major is business administration. I also plan on earning a minor in communication. Once I graduate, I plan on getting a management job with some type of organization. Once I've earned enough money, I plan on opening up a small fitness center. Eventually, I want to expand by opening up more fitness centers or else just opening up other businesses such as movie theatres or restaurants.

Q: What classes do you have now, and have you had?

A: Currently in my second semester, I am taking sixteen credits. I have five three-credit classes which are Spanish 2, Sacred Scripture, Living with the Arts, Introduction to Business and Language, Communication, and Culture. The one credit course I'm taking is called recreational activities. This is a gym class. Last semester I took seventeen credits. The five three-credit courses were Spanish, Leadership, College Algebra, Speech and English Composition. The two one-credit courses were freshman seminar, which was mandatory unfortunately, and physical activities which is another gym class.

Q: What have been some of your favorite classes, and why were they significant to you?

A: Last semester I had two classes which somewhat stood out to me. I was a big fan of my gym class because it was very laid back and I like to run. The other one was speech. My father passed in August, 2007, from esophageal cancer. In speech I was able to give an informative talk about what esophageal cancer is and everything involved with the disease. This was something my dad always wanted to do and it felt good being able to carry his plans out for him in a way. It turns out that I'm not as bad of a public speaker as I originally thought.

Q: What activities do you participate in, either in the community or the university?

A: Unfortunately I do not participate in as many activities as I would like to outside of work and class. I am part of the soccer team, however. I wasn't really part of the team during

the season due to my father's death but I've been training with them in the off season. We play indoor soccer three days a week and I work out either with the team or by myself three days a week as well.

Q: What work do you do, including paid and volunteer work?

A: Currently, I am a certified fitness trainer at Dick's Sporting Goods in Brighton. I am currently a full-time employee as well. I've been with the company since September 18, 2006. I was originally hired into the Troy store but they let me transfer after I decided I was going to school in Ann Arbor. The company lets me transfer back and forth throughout the year. I am very pleased with my current employment.

Q: Do you have a mentor who helps/has helped you prepare for school and/or career? If so, how does/did this person help you?

A: My dad has been a big influence in my life. To be honest, he's probably been the biggest influence. My father taught me a lot up to this point and I like to think that I'm quite a bit like him. Other than him, I've pretty much been doing the rest by myself. My mom and sister have been really supportive and I should also thank my boss, Mike Quirrenbach, who gives me the opportunities to advance.

Q: Describe one highlight of your university experience.

A: In my short time here in Concordia I don't have too many highlights. The one I would like to acknowledge though is the fact that I was on the Dean's List for the first semester. I had five A-s and two As. I finished with a 3.75 GPA. I'm pretty proud of that.

Q: How has the FCA scholarship helped you meet your educational goals?

A: Well, currently my family is not in the best financial situation after my father's passing. The FCA scholarship has helped us a lot more than we planned. You all are covering a big portion of my tuition that we can almost not afford to cover at all. I am very thankful for being chosen for this scholarship.

Q: What advice would you give to high school students about how best to prepare for the university experience and for their career?

A: The best advice I can give is to listen. For the most part, a lot of high school teachers actually know what they're talking about. Your parents may know a bit, too. Once you get to school, just try to organize your time as best as possible. Other than that, you're on your own.

FINLAND TODAY

First, in 2005, the Finnish government enacted a pension reform that made the normal retirement age to be between the ages of 62 and 68. The closer you are to 68, the higher the pension. Because of the higher pension for older people, many Finnish doctors have also chosen to stay on the job. But, many Finnish doctors have also chosen to stay on because of another reason, the shortage of doctors and other medical professionals. For doctors aged 64-69, 41 percent have remained at work. For doctors over 70 years old, 13 percent are still at work. Because the Finnish population is aging more rapidly than most western countries, and the shortage of medical professionals, the Finnish government is working with the Filipino government about the possibility of bringing Filipino medical professionals to Finland. The ground work has already been laid out with the teaching of Finnish language and culture to healthcare professionals in the Philippines. Finland will be one of the first countries in Europe to experience a demographic shock as an estimated 900,000 of its "baby boomer" generation reach retirement age within the next 12 years. Finland's population is about 5.3 million.

The Finnish summer shopping season started on Sunday, May 4th. What that means is that stores larger than 4300 square feet may open their doors on Sunday with hours from 12 noon to 9pm. The summer season will last until the end of August when the stores again must be closed on Sundays, with the exception of small grocery stores, kiosks and some rural shops.

According to the latest poll, the three largest political parties are almost dead even. If elections would be held right now, the National Coalition and the Social Democrats would both receive 22 percent of the vote, while the Center Party would get 21.6 percent. The rest of the vote would go to the many other smaller parties. In a related poll, 73 percent of the people are satisfied with the work of President Tarja Halonen.

The new U.S. Ambassador to Finland is Barbara Barrett of Arizona. She received a unanimous confirmation by the U.S. Senate. Barrett is a lawyer in Arizona and also is the owner of the luxury Triple Creek Ranch in Montana. She succeeds Marilyn Ware as the Ambassador to Finland.

Out of all of the babies born in Finland last year, the most popular name for a girl was Ella. This was followed by Emma, Aino, Anni and Venla. For boys it was Veeti, followed by Eetu, Aleks, Elias and Onni. About 59,000 babies were born in Finland last year.

The Finnish Sanoma Magazines is buying the Russian Lux Media Group. Among the magazines Lux Media publishes are Collezione, a fashion magazine, real estate magazine Homes Overseas, and a wedding magazine Weddingia. Sanoma is at first buying 55% of Lux Media, and the rest by 2012.

Even though there was a lack of snow in southern Finland, the ski resorts in Lapland were doing a booming business. At Ruka, the number of lift tickets sold was up by 10 percent, at Levi, the sales were up by 20 percent, and at Yllas and Saariselka, both had lift ticket sales up by 30 percent. Levi is the most popular ski resort in Finland. Last winter \$11.7 million worth of lift tickets were sold at Levi.

The end of April marked the 80th anniversary of the first radio broadcasting in Finland. The first broadcast came from a station on Radio Hill in Lahti.

Volvo Trucks announced that it will close its bus factory in Tampere. The bus production will be moved to Poland.

Boy, the things you find when you go on the internet. For the first quarter of 2008, the largest foreign investments in Uganda came from Finland and China. Finland's investment in Uganda totaled \$50 million, and about \$29 million from China.

Our main source of income is from the rental of the hall and the lounge. Our Center Manager, Lois Makee, keeps the master calendar for all up coming events and rentals. Getting the date secured on the calendar early for all major events will be necessary to avoid any conflicts. This is not an easy task to coordinate all of these events.

In my report to the membership in the Annual Report for 2007, I outlined a number of challenges that we must meet in 2008. The expenses for the new fiscal year will be higher than they were in 2007. We have little control over the basic items of taxes, heating, lighting, and water bills. We **must** be constantly aware of conserving our use of energy at every opportunity. This is a continuous process.

On the income side of the equation, we can all help by telling our friends and neighbors about the Finnish Center. We need more people talking about the FCA especially that it is easy to locate. Many of you can even tell some wonderful stories about the building of the center. Let them know that we have a hall and a smaller lounge area available for rent. Let them know we have a wonderful Friday Night Buffet and a Fish Fry that is delicious. The public is welcome. Soon there is another all-you-can-eat Spaghetti Dinner which in addition to a great meal and great company is also a fundraiser for the Center. My suggestion is to check over our Calendar of Events and tell your friends, neighbors and even your favorite pet if you have to. Everyone needs to hear about the events at the Finnish Center!

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

The Finns enjoy international acclaim in many fields, not the least of which are architecture and the arts. We have several books in our library which cover these subjects. Some of them are:

800 YEARS OF FINNISH ARCHITECTURE

by J.M. Richards. Fortunately, buildings in Finland are not torn down after a few decades of use as they are in the United States. As a result they have wonderful examples of architecture dating back for many centuries. Some of the earliest are castles and fortresses, three of which are in fairly good condition: the castle in Hämeenlinna and the Turku castle dating to the 1200's, and Olavinlinna in Savonlinna, founded in 1475. There are also several others, in various states of disrepair.

Finland's churches are beautiful works of art. One of the earliest is the church in Nousiainen, built of stone, as were many of that era, in the thirteenth century. Of special interest are the early wooden churches, built by the loving hands of unlearned craftsmen and artisans. Many have ceilings and walls profusely illustrated with pictures of Bible stories which the congregation could study while attending the Latin mass, which they could not understand. Richards devotes two chapters to churches alone.

In later chapters the author covers the works of Finland's modern architects, Eliel Saarinen (whose Helsinki Railway Station, built 100 years ago, is still a magnificent "modern" building), Lars Sonck, Alvar Aalto, just to name a few.

Finland takes pride in its architecture and architects; this book will give you an appreciation of them as well. It's Dewey number is 720.9 Ri.

ATHENEUM GUIDE

The Art Museum of the Atheneum in Helsinki contains foreign as well as Finnish art, but its Finnish collection is what should fascinate Finnish Americans. This book presents some of the best of the Finnish collection. One of my favorites is Albert Edelfelt, who, after studying in Paris, first painted continental-style pictures, but then realized he had very unique subjects in his own country. Eero Järnefelt, Pekka Halonen, Akseli Gellen-Kallela, Juho Rissanen and others, likewise, used local subjects as models. They give us an insight into the life of their times. Peruse this volume and you won't want to miss the Atheneum on your next visit to Finland. You'll find this in 708 At.

KARJALAN KUKKIVA PUU (THE FLOWERING TREE OF KARELIA), edited by Margit Laininen. Finland has had its share of sculptors, most of whom worked in conventional materials, marble, stone, metals, and so on. But Eva Ryynänen, whose work is the subject of this book, was a most

unique sculptress. She studied sculpture for five years in Helsinki, but didn't like conventional materials; she was fascinated by wood. Until just recently, when she passed away, she and her husband had a home and studio named Paateri in the countryside outside of Lieksa. Here she carved works both small and large, some of gigantic proportions. Her "Dancing Bears" is only one of her charming pieces. Besides Finland, her works have sold at least in Sweden, Norway, the Soviet Union, the USA, Canada, Cuba, West Germany, Switzerland and Egypt.

After an introduction in both Finnish and English, this is mainly a picture book illustrating Eva's incredible work. It's worth a look! We have shelved it in 736.4 La.

LIVING IN FINLAND

by Tim Bird; photography by Ingall Snitt. Tim Bird is a British journalist who has lived in Finland since 1982. In this work, published in 2005, he gives the reader an intimate tour of Finnish interiors including those of lakeside cottages ("mökki" in Finland), private homes, handsome country manors, as well as some commercial establishments. Reflecting Finland's forests, there is much use of wood. Finland's creative designers also use just about every building material known to man. The Finns' creativity is evident, for instance, in the "Church in the Rock" in Helsinki. Some homes are fortunate enough to have preserved the beautiful tile stoves ("kaakeliuuni") of old. Accent pieces are often objects created by Finnish designers. Even if you don't have much time or inclination for reading, Ingall Snitt's pictures alone are worth a look. Do take an armchair visit to Finland and experience its unique beauty of design. You'll find the book in 720.9471 Bi.
