FCA SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT INTERVIEW

As this edition of the *FCA Newsletter* is being published, we are approaching the deadline for submitting scholarship applications for the 2009-2010 academic year. Completed applications must be in the FCA office by **March 15**. As a reminder, applications can be downloaded from the FCA website, www.finnishcenter.org, and are also available in the FCA office.

In this second of six interviews with FCA scholarship recipients, you will meet Cale Mannesto, a freshman at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, planning to graduate in 2012. He is the son of FCA members Gary Mannesto and Geneva Halliday. While in high school, he participated in soccer and basketball for four years, served the community by participating in three mission trips and volunteering for four local agencies, and worked as a soccer referee and math tutor. All of these activities while maintaining a 4.0 GPA! Congratulations, Cale!

Q: What is your major, and what are your career plans?

A: I am majoring in business and plan on pursuing a career in finance.

Q: What have been some of your favorite classes, and why were they significant to you?

A: I am only a freshman so I have only taken four classes at Michigan. They are biology, geology, college writing, and calculus one. I didn't really like any of them so maybe I will have better luck next semester.

Q: What activities do you participate in, either in the university or in the community?

A: I am in the fraternity Pi Kappa Phi. We do a lot of community service through the philanthropy group Push America. We did a can drive and business simulation game to raise money for this group. I am also in several business activities including the Michigan Economics Society, Sports Business Association and Business Economics News Club.

Q: What work do you do, including paid and volunteer?

A: I worked three days a week at a maintenance job at the local park, and I interned at a real estate agency three days a week this past summer. I also went on a mission trip to Savannah, Georgia with 70 other students to help rebuild homes for the less fortunate.

Q: Do you have a mentor who helps or has helped you?

A: My parents are my mentors. They have helped me with my school work since I was in elementary school. They instilled a strong work ethic in me that has helped me succeed in school. FINLAND TODAY

First, the coffee drinkers may be doing something right. According to a study done at the University of Kuopio in Finland, coffee drinkers were 70% less likely to develop various dementia diseases, including Alzheimer's disease, compared to those who did not drink coffee.

The study was carried out with 1,400 adults who were middle aged at the beginning of study, for a course of 20 years. Half of the people drank between three to five cups of coffee per day, and the other half did not drink any coffee.

There was no conclusion though as to what was in the coffee that actually caused the decreased risk in developing dementia. The study was published in the Journal of Alzheimer's disease. As you may know, Finns are the greatest coffee drinkers in the world.

The strength among the three major political parties has been almost a dead heat, until recently. According to the current Finland Gallup Poll, the National Coalition Party (right) has about 24.7% support, while the Social Democrats have 21.6% support, and the Center Party has fallen to 19.5%. The rest of the 34.2% goes to the True Finn Party, Left Alliance, Christian Democrats, Swedish Party and several other smaller parties.

Valmet Automotive in Uusi Kaupunki has announced a new product in its assembly plant, a luxury golf cart. Valmet will be producing the golf carts for the Danish Garia A/S company.

Currently Valmet assembles the Porsche Boxter and the Porsche Cayman at its Uusi Kaupunki plant. Later this year, Valmet will start the production of Fiskar Karma hybrid car.

The Finnish government has announced an economic stimulus package worth about \$2.6 billion. It's small by U.S. standards but according to officials, the package will provide 25,000 man-years of employment.

Nokia has bought the German Bit-side programming and consulting firm. Nokia has already been working with Bit-side for its map making services. Bit-side will become part of Nokia Services division.

In Finland's version of the "Oscar" awards, the "Jussi" award, the award for the picture of the year went to an animated feature film called *Niko and the Way to the Stars*. It's the first time that an animated movie was named picture of the year. The film was released last year in the U.S. on home video under the title, *The Flight Before Christmas*.

The story is about a young reindeer who dreams of flying and pulling Santa's sleigh on Christmas like his father. Receiving the Jussi for the leading actor was Tommi Korpela, and the Jussi for the leading actress was Elena Leeve, both were in the movie *Fallen Angels*.

Finland's representative in the Eurovision Song Contest which will be held in Moscow, will be group called Waldo's People. They won the Finnish Eurovision contest with the song "Lose Control".

Finns are continuing to excel in synchronized skating. At the Prague Cup, winning the gold was the Finnish team, Marigold Ice Unity. Getting silver was another Finnish group, Team Unique. The Junior division was won by yet another Finnish team, Ice Steps.

And finally, Hilma and Heikki had just moved into a new neighborhood. The next morning while they were eating breakfast, Hilma saw her neighbor hanging the wash outside. "That laundry is not very clean," Hilma said. "She doesn't know how to wash the clothes correctly, perhaps she needs better laundry soap."

FROM THE FCA LIBRARY

Many of you whose roots are in Finland have ancestors who came from Oulunlääni, possibly from the city of Oulu itself. Located on the Gulf of Bothnia near its northernmost end and at the mouth of the Oulu River, Oulu (population 97,000) is the capital of the province of Oulunlääni.

Oulu is a very old city. Toward the end of the 16th century, King John III of Sweden had a castle built on an island (now known as Linnansaari; "linna" = castle) at the mouth of the Oulu River. The town grew up around this island.

The town received its charter in 1605 from the Swedish King Charles IX. However, already in the 1300s there was a lively trading center there, thanks to a good harbor and a thriving tar industry. Tar was brought down the river from the interior in long tar boats; there it was sold or exchanged for other commodities. In the 19th century Oulu was one of the world's most important export harbors.

In 1822 the town was almost completely destroyed by fire; it was rebuilt according to a plan by C.L. Engel. At this time the town center was moved to the mainland.

Oulu has not stood still; recent years have seen much vigorous development, not without protest, however. A number of young architects of Oulu feel that too much of the old, beautiful wooden buildings have been destroyed and replaced by impersonal structures. They bemoan what has already been demolished, but hope that remaining old treasures, such as Rantakatu with its old wooden buildings dating back to 1882, be preserved as a memorial to the olden days when people from inland came to trade tar for wares. Historical perspective is important, they maintain.

In spite of this, new large residential and office buildings have been erected downtown. There is a new theater, university (founded in 1959), library, university teaching hospital, an ice stadium, swimming pools and new suburbs. Much of the architecture is Alvar Aalto's work. Oulu now has the largest port in northern Finland; four harbors handle 1.5 million tons of merchandise a year. Wood, paper and products from the chemical and electronics industries have replaced tar exports. Oulu is the center of commercial and cultural life in northern Finland.

The Oulu city theater and city orchestra are known throughout Finland. The symphony orchestra presents weekly concerts in the new Madetoja Music Hall on Thursdays from September-May. One can study music at the conservatory.

Oulu has much to offer the tourist. If you are fortunate enough to be there during Juhannus (Midsummer Day) you can take the waterbus to the Turkansaari Open-air Museum to see the lighting of the fire for tar-burning week. Turkansaari has something to offer all summer long: folk dancing, concerts, summer theater, exhibitions, handicraft week, plus

20 old farmhouses from the 17th and 18th centuries and a wooden church from the 1600s.

On the magnificent island of Ainola is the North Ostrobothnia Museum where you will find not only items having to do with Oulu culture, costumes, weapons, coins and medals, glass and porcelain, but also articles connected with the tar-burning trade, as well as a Lappish collections from northern Finland.

The town also has an art gallery, a zoological museum, a geological museum, an automobile museum, and Mikrola, an area for demonstrations and trials of computer equipment and programming. Hupisaari, a park at the mouth of the Oulu River, has a museum, summer theater, children's playground, greenhouses, and water fowl.

An impressive sight in Oulu is the empire-style cathedral, designed by Engel. The interior was renovated and decorated with paintings in 1932. It, like many churches in Finland, is a cruciform church ("ristikirkko"); that is, it is built in the shape of a cross (with all the wings the same length). To the left of the entrance is a monument by Waino Aaltonen commemorating those who fell in the fight for liberation in 1918.

The Oulu City Hall, originally a hotel built in 1885, is a magnificent structure. It was built in anticipation of the railroad's arrival in Oulu. It is said that the people of Oulu wanted to show the "big shots" of Helsinki that they also know how to build elegant buildings.

Oulu is a great place for shopping. In the "tori" one can find local specialties like "rieska" bread, farmhouse cheese, and cloudberries. The old, gray buildings at the edge of the "tori" were used for storage of salt in the olden days, but now house many interesting souvenir shops. The most interesting streets for shopping are Isokatu and Kirkkokatu. Many shops feature Finnish design in glass, china and ceramics.

Oulu is easy to get to via car, bus, train or plane. The Oulu airport is one of the busiest in Finland.
