

HOW DID OUR FINNISH CENTER ASSOCIATION START?

Talk existed for years for a permanent place to hold Finnish activities.

A group gathered at Aira and Urho Kuusisto's home, including Saima and Erik Antilla, Lempi Helin, Laina Lampi, Joseph Moilanen, Irene and Edwin Naasko, Eunice and Noah Potti, Lisa and Harry Sandberg, Sylvia Wiitala, the Finnish Consul Harri Virjo and his wife Irene.

It was time to put talk into action. It was a joint effort of many Finns, the Pottis, along with some help from the Lampis, Dee Abersold and a few others tirelessly went through telephone books, church directories and Finnish clubs looking for Finnish names. Noah, Eunice, and their five children along with her mother, Saima Collin and others, addressed, sorted and prepared a mailing of a questionnaire to see the interest and meet to talk about coming together at a permanent facility, to over 6,000 Finns. An extremely well-attended meeting from the mailing came about and a vote on whether to proceed or not was held at the Polish Century Club. It was a success! Responsibilities were assigned (no time to waste!). Noah was elected chair. Then the hard work of many Finns began to raise money to make this a reality.

The Potti family, among other couples, hosted dinners with many interested people. Harri Virjo hosted cultural events. Noah Potti, Harri Virjo and Urho Kuusisto met with and welcomed the Finnish President, Urho Kekkonen. Many Finns volunteered by hosting lunches, bake sales, yard sales, paper drives, coffee hours and dances. Lempi Helin hosted affairs, including a fashion show, at her mansion on the lake. Laina Lampi sold her rugs, Viola Pudas gave Finnish language lessons. Aira Kuusisto sold imported Finnish goods from her home. Events also took place at Kalevela Park and church grounds. Many others gave of themselves in contributing to the development of the FCA. What a description of SISU!

Noah had a wall-sized map where colorful pins were posted for each residence to determine the best location. With tireless energy, time and effort, Noah Potti, Alfred Wanting, Saima Antilla, and Reverend Elmer Liimata chose the property for the future home of the FCA on 8 Mile Road.

Try for just a moment and visualize what the future FCA site looked like back in 1973. Only a few industrial buildings nearby and out in the grasslands in the middle of nowhere! No freeways going to the area and the roads that were there had extremely low speed limits, making it for a long drive during construction overview.

In 1973, ground was broken and the FCA was dedicated in September 1974. The names of the main "doers" in making the FCA a reality was on a plaque displayed at the entrance of the FCA. Along with the Finnish American Center, the major plan included building the 92 units called Tapiola Village Senior Housing. This was part of the plan to give the older Finns the ability to walk to the center for coffee and affairs.



In 1976, Harry Sandberg, a seafarer from Hanko, gifted the large Hanko Rock (right) to the Finnish Center Association. Hanko was the port of departure for many Finnish emigrants and was their last sight of Finland. It is now proudly displayed outside near the flagpoles.

Looking back at the long road, with all the hard work and dedication of many Finns, we have much to be proud of. The FCA is an outstanding gathering place for us. Thousands of events have taken place over the years. We encourage participation, volunteering and giving so this dream will continue. FINNISH AMERICAN SINGERS OF MICHIGAN

The Finnish American Singers of Michigan, led by director William Gramzow, IV, is a group of amateur vocalists that love to sing with a long and active history. Based out of the FCA, and practicing Monday evenings at that location, the group prepares for two concerts each year, a Christmas concert in early December and a spring concert in early May. For many years the choir has been invited to perform at summer FinnFest celebrations all over the United States. Active for more than thirty years, the choir has sung in Oregon, Minnesota, New York, and both the Upper and Lower peninsulas of Michigan for example. Prior to FASM, many of the early members sang as the Loon Lake Singers, attending FinnFests every year beginning in 1983. Most recently, FASM was thrilled to be asked to lead the singing of the national anthems and Finlandia at the opening of the 2019 FinnFest in Novi, MI.

FASM has enjoyed longevity in their directors as well. With its origins as the Loon Lake Singers, the choir was led by Irja Connolly who eventually was helped by Eero Karinen. When the Finnish American Singers choir was officially formed around 1991, Lisa Potti was the director. Henry (Hank) Naasko succeeded her, directing for about 25 years until Bill Gramzow took over in 2018. Bill had been the choir's accompanist for many years, so is very familiar with the choir and its goals.

Dealing with Covid -19 issues has taken a toll on the choir. With our gathering and practice location closed and quarantines, not to mention warnings about singing, the group has not met to sing since March, 2020. We have gathered outside for a couple of meetings and happily celebrated the planting of an evergreen tree last fall at the Finnish Center in honor of Hank Naasko's many years of dedication to music there. More recently, many choir members sadly attended the funeral in March of our oldest member, Charlotte Lytikainen. We hope to be able to gather, if just outdoors this summer, to sing together, share updates about each other and our families, and plan for resuming practices and concerts.

The choir would love to have new members and can use all voices from soprano to bass. We do not memorize our music and sing the few Finnish ones by learning the words phonetically. Feel free to contact choir president, Katy Koskela at kakoskela@hotmail.com with questions!

SOMETHING NEW IN FINLANDIA GARDENS


Although the Finnish Center has been closed for over a year due to the Covid pandemic, Finlandia Gardens and the FCA wood shop have continued forward with proper pandemic protocols. For the first time in the last 20 years the wood shop has been open all winter due to a new propane heater provided by Tom Evans, our on-site finish carpenter. This winter we have reorganized the Wood Shop, repaired many garden items, and helped a number of residents at senior housing with needed projects. Innovations have been added to the gardens to enhance their beauty and usefulness to members and visitors. These changes include the rebuilding of the glider from senior housing and its installation in the West Gardens across the bridge. Also, a new structure with the names of cities familiar to Michigan Finns can be seen as you drive into the parking lot. A new covered gazebo is located on the deck, south of the parking lot, and will provide seating away from the weather. It also has a Little Free Library and is a great place to view the gardens and have a snack or lunch on a rainy day.

Finlandia Gardens is abound with the sounds of birds and the beauty of spring blossoms as we continue through this amazing season. Come to the gardens, forget the sadness of what we have lost in this pandemic, and find something hopeful in our gardens.


