Happy New Year!

According to a Finnish proverb, midwinter is karhu kylkeänsä kääntää, meaning "when the bear rolls over onto his other side."

The milestone will be celebrated at Heikinpäivä throughout January at the Finnish-American Heritage Center in Hancock, MI. The month-long celebration culminates with a parade, polar plunge, and dances on January 27. Held annually since 1999, the mid-winter festival features workshops on Finnish crafts and cooking, markets, polar plunge into the frigid waters of the Portage Canal, music and dancing, and other fun winter games.

The celebration's themes are taken from the Finnish folk sayings associated with the name day for Heikki (St. Henrik's day, traditionally January 19), including Heikki heinät jakaa (Heikki divides the hay) and Talven selkä poikki (winter's back is broken). The bear – an ancient Finnish and Sami symbol — is always a familiar figure in the celebrations.

The most popular events at Heikinpäivä are kicksled races for kids and the always entertaining wife-carrying contest! Basic rules require one spouse to carry the other through an obstacle course featuring scenes of traditional Finnish domestic life. Agility, strength, speed and a sense of humor are required.

FINLAND'S INDEPENDENCE DAY

Finland's 106th Independence Day Celebration was held on December 2, 2023, at the Finnish Center. FinnFolk, our resident band, performed Finnish music during cocktail hour. The program started with a flag ceremony and Finnish and American national anthems. Roy and Ryan Takakura were flag bearers with Elias and Lillian Kirschenmann. Mrs. Marilyn Metsa-Clark gave the welcoming speech and introduced performers Kyoko Kashiwagi on violin and Naki Sung Kripfgans on piano who performed pieces of Leevi Madetoja, a Finnish composer. After a delicious dinner Marilyn introduced our keynote speaker, Anu Muhonen, a Professor of Finnish studies at the University of Toronto.

Anu Muhonen gave a very interesting speech where she addressed how Finnish composers, writers and, poets build Finnish national identity with the power of words and music during the national romantic era before our independence. Muhonen connected her speech to the musical repertoire performed during the evening by Kyoko, Naki, Katri and Jennifer. She also discussed that Jean Sibelius, Toivo Kuula and their friends and colleagues in the Finnish art circles worked hard to build the momentum of the Finnish folk, Finland's people.

She analyzed Sibelius *Finlandia* and reminded us how the significance of *Finlandia* describing Finland's national longing for freedom is unique among the world's compositions. Muhonen discussed how we can express our belonging and heritage in the way we show appreciation to Finnish arts and cultural representations but also addressed that a common way to preserve our Finnish legacy is to keep our cultural traditions alive. One good way to do this is to organize events such as the Independence Day celebration.

Muhonen also drew examples from her research among Finnish Canadian seniors in Toronto and reflected that these stories can be placed in the era of the entire 106-year history of independent Finland. The whole story of Finland's history is heard in them. They reflect a wide range of world-historical and cultural-historical events and eras. The stories of every person are also stories of the history of Finland, Canada, North America, and the whole world.

The program ended with a beautiful performance of music by Toivo Kuula (another Finnish composer) performed by Katri Ervamaa, cello, Naki Sung Kripfgans piano, and Jennifer Goltz, voice, and culminating with of *Finlandia* by Jean Sibelius.

Thank you very much to for all the volunteers for making the program a success. A special thank you goes to Sarah Wiideman, Kathryn Hill, Nancy Rajala, Sherrill Tedford, Janet Suomi and Katri Ervamaa for their contributions to the program.

FINNISH CULTURAL CENTER TURNS 50 IN 2024 - PART 5

In the September, 2023 issue of the FCA News we noted that our Cultural Center Building will be turning 50 in September of 2024. In this issue the fifth group of sponsors from the 1974 dedication ceremony is listed below.

As I typed the names of those sponsors into this article I was very careful to record them exactly as they were originally printed in the program, noting that so many of the names from fifty years ago have the Finnish vowels \ddot{a} and \ddot{o} . In my college courses in German I learned that these two dots over the character are called an umlaut, but the Finnish word is **pisteet**. In the 2015 FCA directory the Finnish letters \ddot{a} and \ddot{o} no longer appear in the names and have been replaced with a and o respectively. This certainly contributes to the anglicized way that we often pronounce the names now!

JANUARY IN THE FINLANDIA GARDENS



January comes from the name of the Roman god, Janus, meaning new beginnings or transitions, expressions of garden expectations. In January the gardens are sleeping and gardeners are anticipating the first signs of spring, which will appear next month.

SOUNDS OF JOY, BEAUTY, HUMOR AT FASM CHRISTMAS CONCERT November 26, 20023

"From Start to Finnish" was the title of this winter concert, and seven of the seventeen songs were in Finnish. So that all in the audience could understand and appreciate these seven pieces, their English translations were included in the program. And, when the audience was invited to sing along with the choir on the final piece, "Finlandia hymni," many people joined in, whether in English or in Finnish.

Five soloists were featured during the concert: Nancy Jacobs, on "Kun joulu valkeneepi;" Vickie Kimler, on "Joulupuu on rakennettu;" Paul Rajala (also in Finnish) on "White Christmas;" Karen Gasinski, on "Little Tiny Child;" and Cortney Standifer on "Joulu hymni." This last piece began with a beautiful introduction by the choir's accompanist, Hope McGookey. She played the intro on a kantele that had arrived previously from Finland and was placed somewhere in storage within the FCA building. This past summer cleaning out areas behind the main hall curtain area it was discovered. The singers were authorized to have the instrument examined and tuned by a local luthier so it could be played rather than just sitting in its shipping crate. Hopefully, Hope will continue her studies of the kantele so it can be featured in future concerts.

Musical humor always appears in the singers' concerts. "Mistletoe" was a musically interesting piece, with each of the four verses moving to a higher key, and singer Marcia Cave - wife of Music Director Alex Cave - holding a piece of mistletoe over Alex's head and giving him a kiss on the cheek at the end of the piece. Also humorous was "The Twelve Days AFTER Christmas," a funny take-off on "The Twelve Days Of Christmas." The audience responded with laughter during both pieces.

"Bell Carol of the Kings" was a complex, unusual, lovely blend of two pieces, the Ukrainian "Carol of the Bells" and "We Three Kings of Orient Are". Handel's "Joy to the World" was the favorite carol of the FASM's former Music Director, Hank Naasko, who passed away earlier this year, and was dedicated to his memory.

The singers will perform again at their Spring Concert... I'll be there, and hope that you'll enjoy it also!

Library Evaluation and Woven Hangings Inventory

Work continues on the professional evaluation of the materials in the FCA library collection. Close communication with the archivist at the Finnish American Historical Archive (FAHA) in Hancock, Michigan is taking place ensuring that materials better suited for their archives than our library will be transported there. The goal, as with any professionally organized and managed library, is to tailor the collection to the patrons that will be using it. Hopefully the library will be more appealing, user-friendly, and accessible as this process continues!

The inventory of the woven hangings, ryijy and raanu, owned by the Center, will continue after the holidays. Along with a database of statistics and details about each hanging, there will be an accompanying picture. After a full inventory is finished (we are about half done now), storage capabilities will be assessed. At this point, it appears that accessible and safe storage may be an issue for everything we currently own. Options have been discussed with the board and will be further pursued after the completion of the inventory. Members will be kept informed.


