


GIFT SHOP

NOTES ON SPRING



MEET KARJALA

In the past, this author has introduced you to individual Finnish American Singers of Michigan members, relating especially their backgrounds in the Finnish culture and/or their history with the choir. Today I would like to highlight one of the <u>songs</u> the choir will be singing in our spring concert,


Say It With Music, Karjalan Kunnailla (On the Hills of Karjala).

Now blossoms a tree on the lands of Karelia Now thickens up the birch forests of Karelia, "cuckoo cuckoos" there and it's spring, Take my endless longing to there.

I know your hilly forests and mountain belts, And the smoke of your swiddens and the slumbering nights, And the untouched trees of your forests, And your looming straits and the mouths of your fjords.

[Swiddens are areas cleared by burning]

Typically Finnish, the beauty of the land with its mountains, trees, and lakes, is the main focus of the song.



Where is Finnish Karelia? What makes it a distinctive place? Why is it special?

Wikipedia describes the area as an "historical province of Finland, consisting of the modern-day Finnish regions of South Karelia and North Karelia plus the historical regions of Ladoga Karelia and the Karelian isthmus, which are now in Russia," and explains, "A large part of Finnish Karelia was ceded by Finland to the Soviet Union in 1940 after the Soviet aggression known as the Winter War, when the new border was established close to that of 1721. *(Shown in the mid-shaded area on the map.)* More than 400,000 evacuees from the ceded territories then re-settled in various parts of Finland. During the Continuation War of 1941–44, most of the ceded area was liberated by Finnish troops, but in 1944 was occupied again by the Red Army. After the war, the remains of the Province of Viipuri were made into the Province of Kymi. In 1997 the province was incorporated within the province of Southern Finland. The Karelian question refers to the debate regarding the return of the ceded territory to Finland." East Karelia has been under Russian control for a very long time and still remains in Russian Federation. With the upheaval over time in these areas, it is estimated the indigenous language is spoken only by about 5,000 people now.

Online, *Visit Finland* has a page devoted to North Karelia and their "captivating national parks and traditional culture." Check it out to see places, history, or food to whet your interest and provide background information! <u>https://www.visitfinland.com/en/articles/north-karelia-region/</u>

Perhaps some of you have enjoyed a Karelian pie, karjalanpiirakka – a pastry originally from Eastern Karelia. Because wheat will not grow in the area (too far north), they are made from unleavened rye flour and filled with semolina, mashed potatoes, carrots, or possibly mushrooms, oats, fresh cheese or berries. Cooked until crispy and slathered with melted butter or served with egg butter, although not sweet are tasty. You be the judge! <u>https://www.saimaalife.com/recipe-finnish-karelian-pies/</u>
